Dear Sir:
It was rather ironical to note that at the meeting of February 3rd, 1964, after coming to the decision that they had no objection to having Township owned equipment perform various services for a race track, Council listened to a very favourable and well prepared report of achievement and expectations presented by Mr. Allan Sumner chairman of the Township Parks and Recreation Committee.
This report listed, among other things, achievements by the Committee during the past year, 1963, and proposed certain other things which would improve and expand their activities for 1964. One of the points brought up in the report was the difficulty of getting certain

services performed by private contractors, such as grass cutting, snow clearing of the skating rinks and occasional hand labour for odds and ends such as setting fence posts and the like.
No member of Council proposed that, as the Township had men and machines (on which they receive a 50% subsidy from the Provincial Government), it might be a good idea to have the municipality perform these services. This, of course, would leave that much more of the recreational dollar to be spent on expanding and improving the already inadequate facilities for this purpose. As they could see nothing wrong with providing service for race track owners and devotees, the irony becomes very apparent indeed.
Mr. Sumner and the Parks and Recreation Committee are to be highly commended for

their present aims as well as past achievements and it would be a shame if they were handicapped in any way by the Twp. Council refusing to proffer help of this nature in any organization dedicated to the betterment of the amenities of life, in which the Township residents as a whole benefit. The help should be forthcoming just as readily for this purpose as it is for the non-participating race track.
Think it over neighbour and let the Council know just how you feel in this matter. If you agree with them they will no doubt be glad to hear from you and if you don't it will let them know that many residents place a higher value on community recreation and sport than they do on the Sport of Kings.

What's New In The Library

The Journeys-Echo-Freya Stark
This book of observations and impressions from Miss Stark's travels may serve to acquaint a wider public with the work of this fine writer. In the forward Lawrence Durrell writes—"a poet of travel, whose Muse has been wholly Arabian in plumage, and whose books span half a century of historical time." I can think of nothing more exciting than to stumble for the first time (and if possible purely by hazard) upon prose so melodious, so energetic and so spare."
Two Middle Aged Ladies in Andalusia by Penelope Chetwoode.
This is the delightful account of two middle aged ladies (one a 12 year old horse called the Marquessa) on a riding trip through rural Spain. The author had little knowledge of the language of the country but the people were so friendly and willing to help she had no difficulty in being understood.
She tells of the old fashioned inns where fireplaces are used for cooking on the one hand and a modern electric hair dryer was available on the other, to get her hair washed and set. Where people live in caves but the children were the healthiest and happiest she had seen anywhere. Altogether this is a most extraordinary book.

Presentation To Retiring School Board Member

Members and their wives of the Stouffville District High School Board attended a dinner at the high school on Wednesday evening given by the members of the high school staff. Mr. John R. Groom was the chairman of the dinner and the evening address was given by Mr. R. Mercer, another member of the staff.
Mr. A. G. Thompson, board member for twenty years was presented with a pen and pencil set by members of the school staff and Mrs. June Buton presented Mr. Thompson with a cuff link set on behalf of the school board. All the 1964 board members and their wives attended as well as Mr. Chas. Jackson, secretary, and Mrs. Jackson.
Mr. Mercer in addressing the gathering, complimented Mr. Thompson on his long period of service. He said he had attended Toronto University along with two of Mr. Thompson's sons, Jack and Bill. In accepting the gifts, Mr. Thompson said he was taken completely by surprise and could not have been more surprised if he had received a wire from Ottawa to take John Diefenbaker's place. He said that the young people emigrating to this country were showing appreciation of the freedom of obtaining an education and the standing of these students did not cast a favourable comparison on the boys and girls who were born here.
In conclusion, he suggested that greater discipline was required in the home and continued on in the schools. He asked all teachers to take firm action to discourage gang attacks.
During the evening the gathering viewed a special art display which had been provided by Mr. Geo. Foord for the benefit of the night class students.
