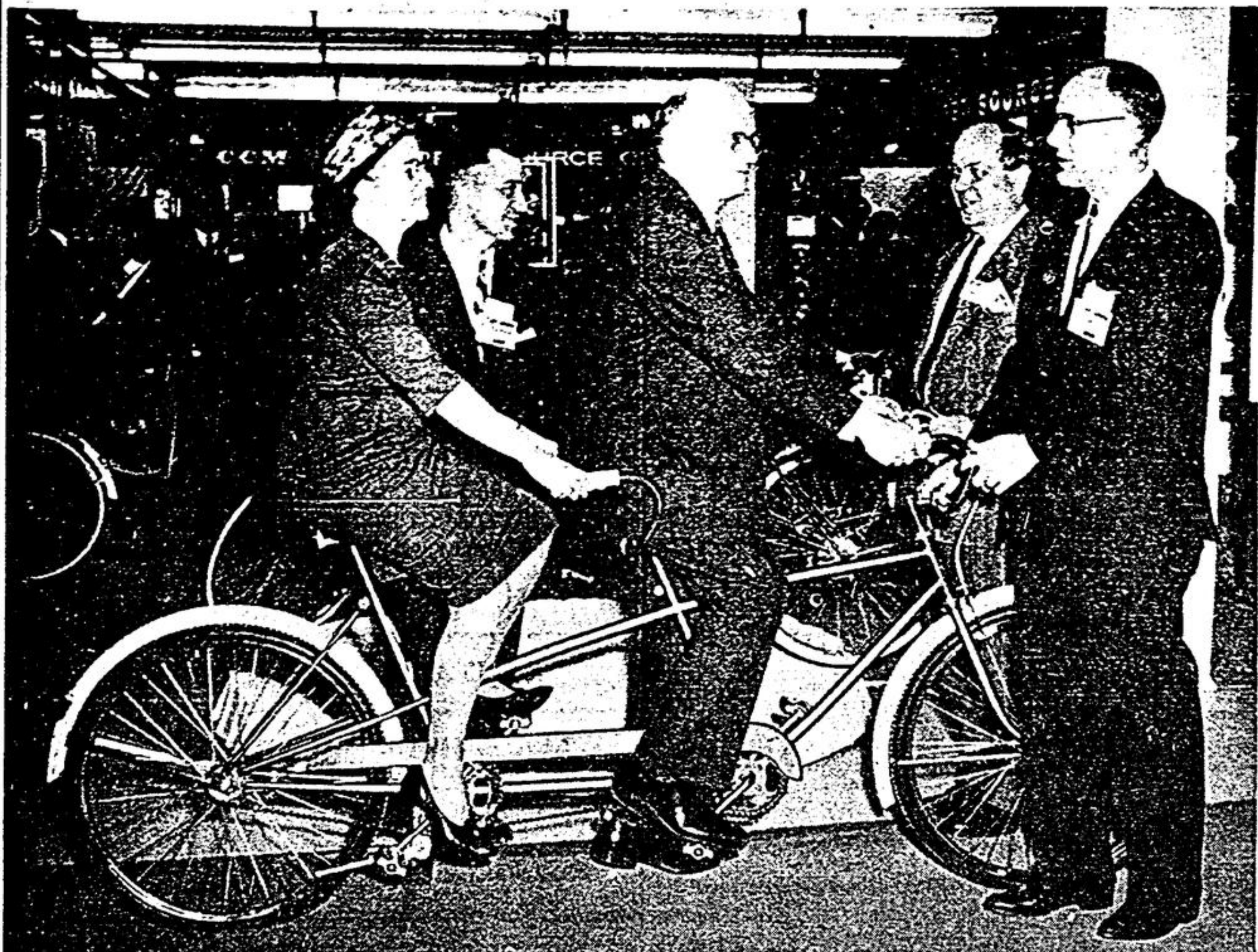


Crest Staff Attend Hardware Show
