Farmers' Income Sets Record In Canada

Farm cash income reached a record \$3,222,335,000 in 1963, 2.2 per cent above 1962's previous peak of \$3,154,240,000, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported last week.

The total includes cash income from sale of farm products, Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops, net cash advances on farm-stored grain in Western Canada and deficiency payments under the provisions of the Agricultural Stabilization Act.

Largest contributors to the gain were receipts from the sale of wheat, coarse grains, tobacco, dairy products and poultry products.

Restaurant Fight Brings 10-Day Jail Term

A skirmish in Markham Village restaurant on Jan. 31, has resulted in a 10-day jail sentence for a Whitchurch Twp. youth, Joseph Dart, Con. 9 was convicted by Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake with causing a disturbance when he appeared in Richmond Hill Court on Tuesday. Murray "Pete" Fockler of Stouffville, a second party in the brawl, testified that he was in the premises but the fight was started by Dart. His charge was dismissed.

Magistrate Hollinrake has placed Dart on a \$500 two-year peace bond to be effective on his release from jail. He was warned not to associate with former friends or frequent the places where he was continually getting into trouble.

Markham JC's Organize Move To Hold Land For Future Hospital Site

(Continued from Front Page) nal payroll added would be secondary and rather stressed the chances of survival in time of accident crisis if a hospital were nearby. There was a six months waiting period at the Scarborough Hospital unless the case was an emergency, the group was told. Mr. McHarg revealed that Markham could have had a bequest of \$100,000 a few years ago if it had had a hospital trust fund established. He pointed out that the price of the proposed site could well rise to four times the present value in the next few years and for this reason the move must be made now.

Mr. Deacon said he had had some experience in hospital matters having served on the York Central campaign and been a member of York County Council at the time when the Newmarket Hospital was in grave financial difficulty. He reviewed the local hospital services, going back to the time when Markham was served primarily by the Toronto East General. Scarborough, he said was not overloaded and there was Richmond Hill. "We are very well serviced at present," he said.

He pointed out to the gathering that the cost for an active treatment hospital was approximately \$20,000 a bed and it required \$15 a day to maintain each bed after it was built. Mr. Deacon suggested that the convalescent type hospital was the one towards which many municipalities were moving and said that this type was much needed and in addition was much cheaper to build and maintain.

The speaker gave the projected population of Markham and surrounding area as twenty to twenty-five thousand by 1969

and estimated the cost of erecting a hospital at \$1,200,000. Of this amount he believed that there would be forthcoming \$600,000 in government grants.

Mr. Deacon suggested that the Ontario Hospital Services Commission might not look favourably on hospital development in Markham. "They favour centralized facilities," he said. However, he predicted, "if you really want a hospital and go after it, you'll get it." This was one item in which the politician found it hard to say "no". In addition, he said that Metro Toronto was not looking favourably on the financing of their large hospitals when they were servicing 20% of the patients from outside the city.

"The hospital service is needed in the suburbs such as Markham, but I can assure you that nothing will happen if you leave it to the Hospital Services Commission or the Government," said Mr. Deacon. "If you work on a four to five year program, you'll get it."

Mr. Pete Mason, another Chamber member, thanked Mr. Deacon for his remarks on behalf of the group and the balance of the evening was left for questions and a discussion period.

Markham Firm Exports to U-K

White-Rogers Ltd. of Markham has established a sales office in England with the expectation of \$450,000 in business during the first year of operation.

The firm manufactures automatic heat control equipment. Eventually, 30 different controls will be imported from Ontario to supply the rapid gains being made in central heating, according to R. W. Jelbart, U.K. sales manager for the company.
