# Pick Two Top Speakers From Four Counties

Twelve top orators representing high schools in Halton, Peel, York (outside Metropolitan Toronto) and Ontario counties will compete in a provincial semi-final (zone) public speaking contest on Friday evening, Feb. 21st, at Anderson High School, Whitby, for the honour of representing these four counties in the provincial final public speaking contest next month in Toronto.

The twelve outstanding speakers who will compete at Whitby in this provincial semi-final contest are the district finalists for the four counties and represent some 25,000 high school students who have taken part in local oratorical competitions in the county high schools in the past few months.

Two winners, one from the prepared speech section and the other from the impromptu section will be selected by the judges on Friday night at Whitby to enter the 1964 provincial final public speaking contest to be held on Monday, March 30th during the Ontario Educational Association convention, in Toronto, at the King Edward-Sheraton Hotel. Zone winners from all parts of the province, representing some 510,000 students, will compete in the final oratorical contest for high school students.

One of the major public speaking events of the year this Friday, February 21st provincial semi-final contest in Whitby is co-sponsored by the Ontario Educational Association, the Ontario School Trustees and Ratepayers' Association and the Ontario Municipal Electric Association (Municipal Hydro commissions). The provincial final public speaking contest on March 30th is co-sponsored by Ontario Hydro.

Hydro Trophies To Winners An attractive, engraved, silver cup and a suitably engraved Hydro shield donated by the Ontario Municipal Electric Association will be presented to the winners of the provincial semi-final contest at Whitby. All the runners-up in this contest will receive valuable book prizes.

The competition at Anderson High School, Whitby, will commence about 8:00 p.m. Officials of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association will present the Hydro cup and the shield to the winners.

## Would Maintain Old CPR Station

The Canadian Pacific Railway will be advised by Pickering Township Council that this body is not in favour of the railway removing the Cherrywood station although it is no longer in use.

Councillor Newman said this could be one more step which might make it more difficult to obtain commuter service in the future.

The siding nearby is still operated through the Agincourt Station.

## Turn Down Request For Wreck Compound

On a recorded vote Pickering Township council unanimously turned down a request from J. Bath, operator of the Imperial Oil Station on No. 2 highway, to establish a wrecked car compound for the police. The turn-down vetoed a recommendation of the township planning board.

Councillor Campbell said he was definitely not in favour of the move. He said such an establishment would hurt the commercial assessment already established. He pointed out that the township had had enough trouble with wrecking yards previously. "Our business is to administer the affairs of the township not to listen to what everybody says. I'm surprised at Mr. Bath even wanting this thing," he said.

Mrs. McPherson, deputy-reeve said in her opinion one of the present car wreckers could handle this job for the police — that this was not a necessity.

## Wants Bigger Library Grant

Mrs. R. Howarth appeared before Pickering Twp. council on Monday night on behalf of the Pickering Village public library. The library is seeking an increase in grant from the township, which is presently \$50 a year.

Mrs. Howarth stated that some 176 persons from the township used the village library. The township presently pays a grant of \$100 to those libraries wholly within the township and the smaller grant to the village.

Reeve Laycox suggested the decision be left with council committee for study.

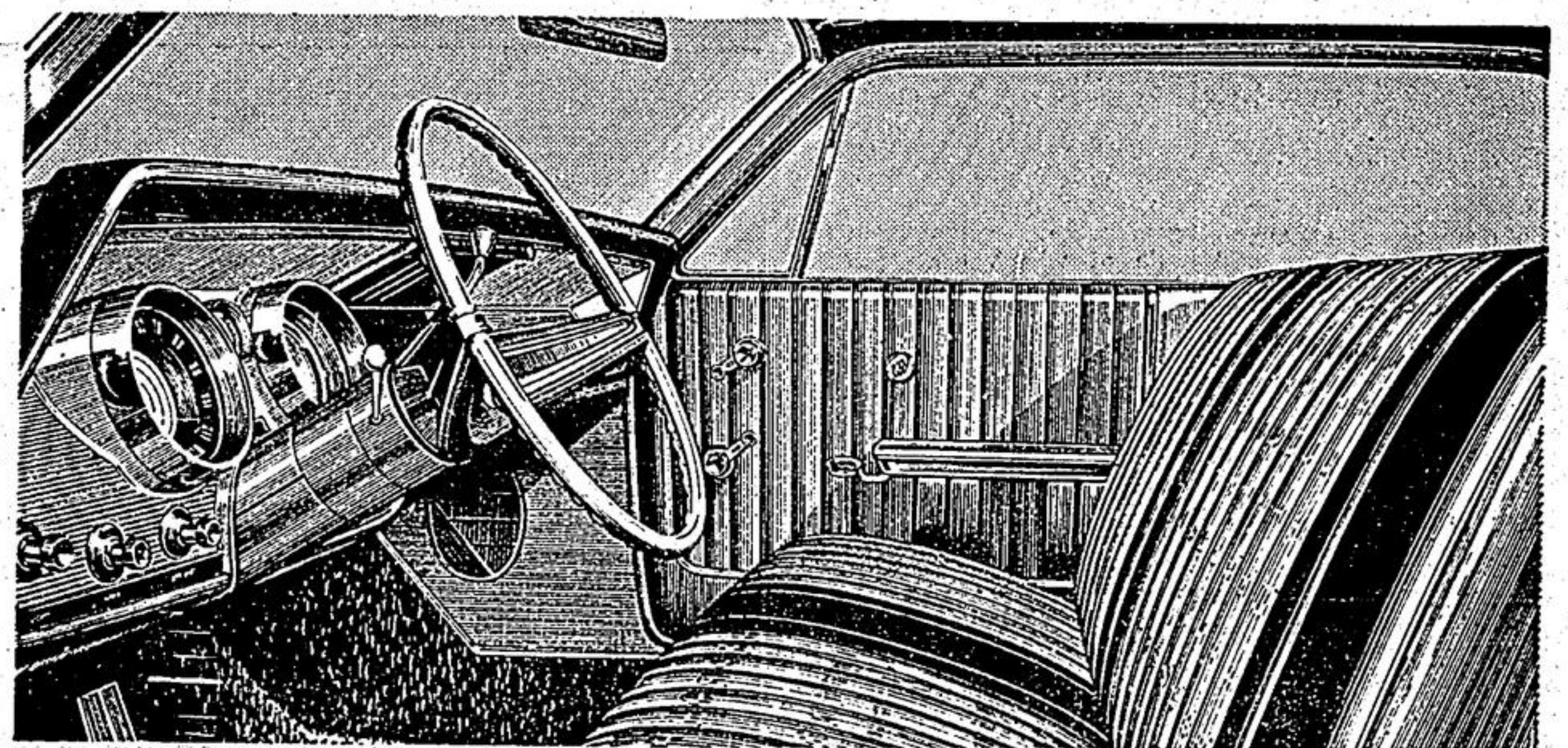
