On Thursday, he scored two tallies and assisted on two others. Storry and Wilkins netted singles. Shelley Sugden collected a pair of assists.

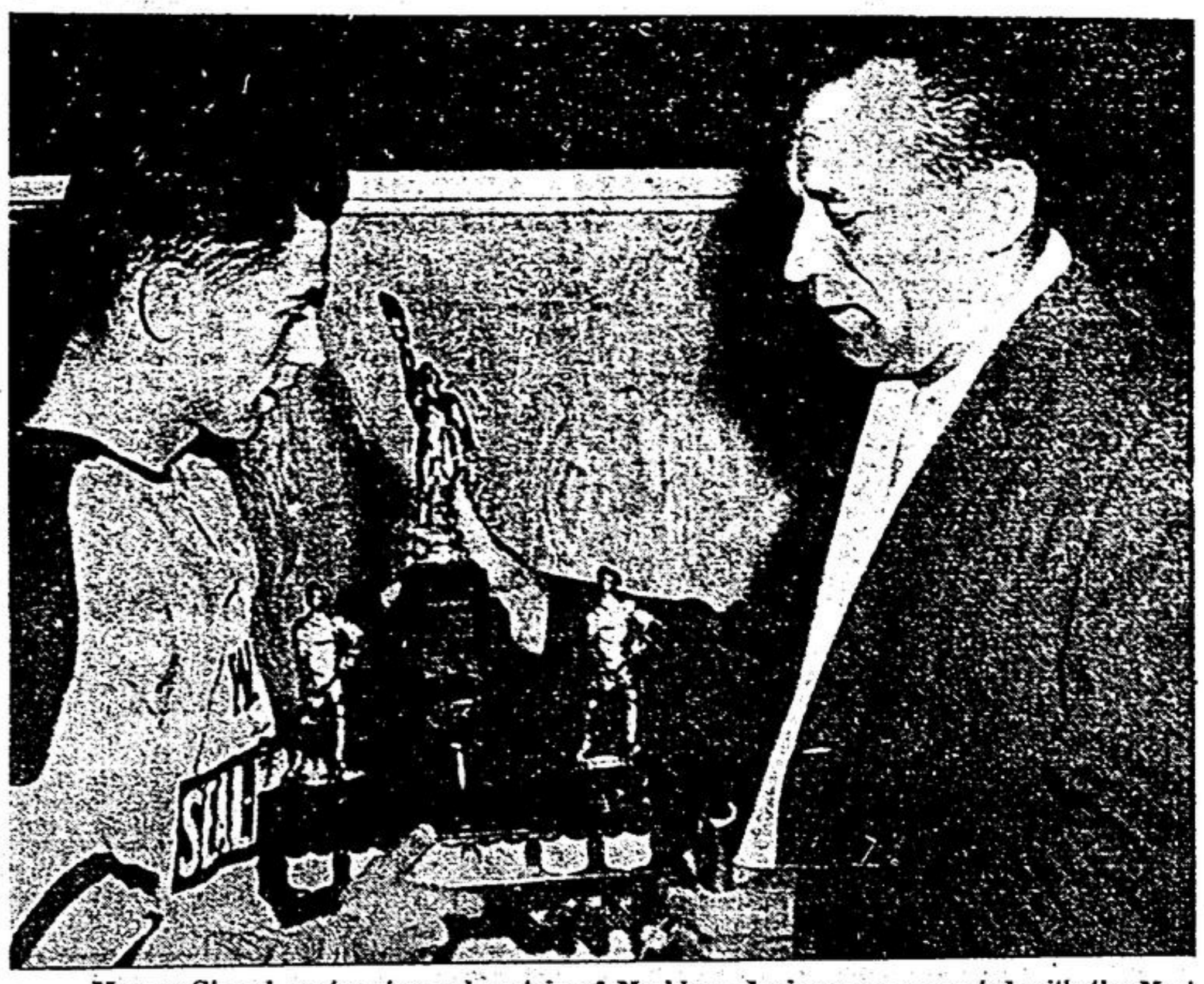

Just at a time when hockey playoff interest had reached a fever pitch in Markham, the home-town club bowed to Neil McNeil "Maroons" in three straight games.

In like manner, St. Michael's who couldn't fight their way out of a wet paper bag throughout much of the regular schedule, swept their semi-final series with Whitby in three straight.

It marks a repeat of the same story that has plagued local entries in junior competition for many years. The Leaf chain, that includes both St. Mike's and Neil McNeil are just too strong for local competition. These two teams will now compete for the western group title in an all-Toronto series. Few people could care less who emerges as the eventual winner aside from a couple of coaches and the parents of the players involved.

At Markham on Friday night, more than 900 fans witnessed the second game that was taken by Neil McNeil 4-3. On Sunday, at Tam-O-Shanter, the Toronto squad rallied to claim a 7-6 win.

The one bright spot in the whole affair was the presentation of the Most Valuable Player Award to Markham's Murray Stroud on Friday night. Bob Watt, executive convener of Oshawa performed this duty. Murray also captured the point-scoring trophy but this award had not been located prior to game time.

Markham, with their new arena, has retained its reputation as a good hockey town and fan interest was most apparent during both the regular schedule and playoffs.
