DOG HOUSES HEATED Electrically Keep Pets Comfortable
Living in a dog house, even during bitterly cold winter weather, can be really comfortable, if it's electrically heated.
Comfort living is apparently what two large female dogs, a German Shepherd and a Great Dane have enjoyed in sharing a large electrically-heated dog kennel on a 300-acre farm on No. 7 highway, five miles east of Brampton. Another dog of a much smaller breed, a tiny Toy Terrier, named Tinker, owned by T. J. McDonough, 100 Victoria Street, Milton, also remains in the outdoors in frigid weather in an all-electric dog house and seems to thoroughly enjoy the experience.
Indeed, the owners of these canines in Milton and in the Brampton area maintain that the dogs being outside virtually all the time are much healthier. In the case of the two large dogs in the Brampton area, they are not suited for indoor living and appear to be happy and contented in their outdoor environment. Their dog house offers easy access and exit through a swinging door. This dog house is 12 feet by 15 feet and is heated by a three kilowatt convector type electric heater. It provides an even flow of heat throughout the kennel. There is plenty of humidity since there is no flame, and therefore, no burning oxygen.
At the Milton home, the kennel is situated at the rear of the dwelling and access and exit facilities have been installed into a sunporch by Mr. McDonough soloist.
