which he resided, near Wilcox Lake, a 13-room school had been built resulting in a high tax rate. He said this tax had to come from persons using cottages as permanent dwellings. Quite a number of these had become unfit for habitation and were torn down. The result was that the school had three vacant rooms but the debenture debt remained for those who were left, to pay. He told the deputation to draw up a list of ratepayers objections which council could review with the planning consultant.

There was no further discussion but Mr. Snider made it clear he would not be pleased with any change in the present conditions.

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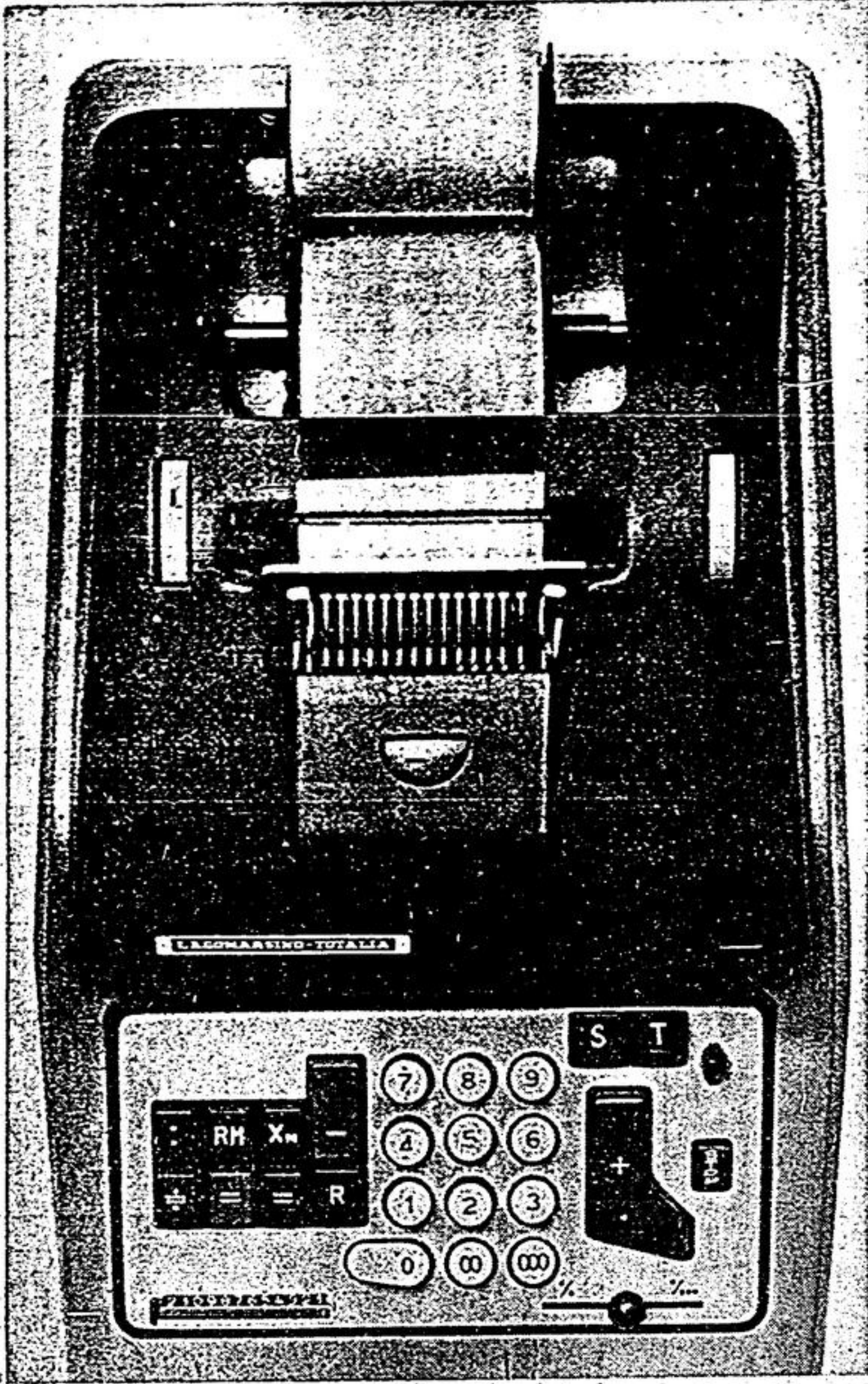
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Would Maintain Musselman's Lake For Cottagers Only

Whitchurch Township Council reaffirmed their stand on Monday night to maintain the Musselman's Lake strictly as a cottage region and not for permanent dwellings. The matter was given considerable time for discussion when Patrick Cashman, secretary-treas. of the Musselman's Lake Ratepayers' Assoc., appeared before council and requested a meeting of council, the ratepayers and the Ontario Municipal Board. He was advised that a meeting of council and the ratepayers along with the township planning consultant was feasible, but not with the O.M.B. as they only attend meetings to deal with matters in dispute.

Mr. Snider who accompanied the ratepayers' sec'y-treas., said he found it impossible to see what objective council had in mind in the proposed zoning of the lake area. He said nearly all the lots were designated as fifty feet and it would not be possible

to make a change. He said he thought it was too late to try and zone them for 15,000 sq. ft. Reeve Frank Williams said he had attended a recent ratepayers' meeting at the lake where these matters had all been explained. Deputy-reeve Ross Farquharson said the objective was to maintain the lake as a summer cottage region and not for permanent homes. The tax returns on these summer homes, he said, did not provide sufficient revenue for the cost of education to say nothing of the cost of all the other services.

Reeve Williams drew attention to the 1964 budget which he said would contain \$50,000 for welfare, and the area under discussion absorbed considerable of this amount. Councillor Alvin Farmer wanted to know if the deputation was not aware that a large amount was spent on relief in this lake area.

Deputy-reeve Farquharson said that while the Municipal Board would not attend any discussion meeting, if the zoning bylaw was passed, the Board would attend a public hearing to hear objections. The deputy-reeve said that in the area in

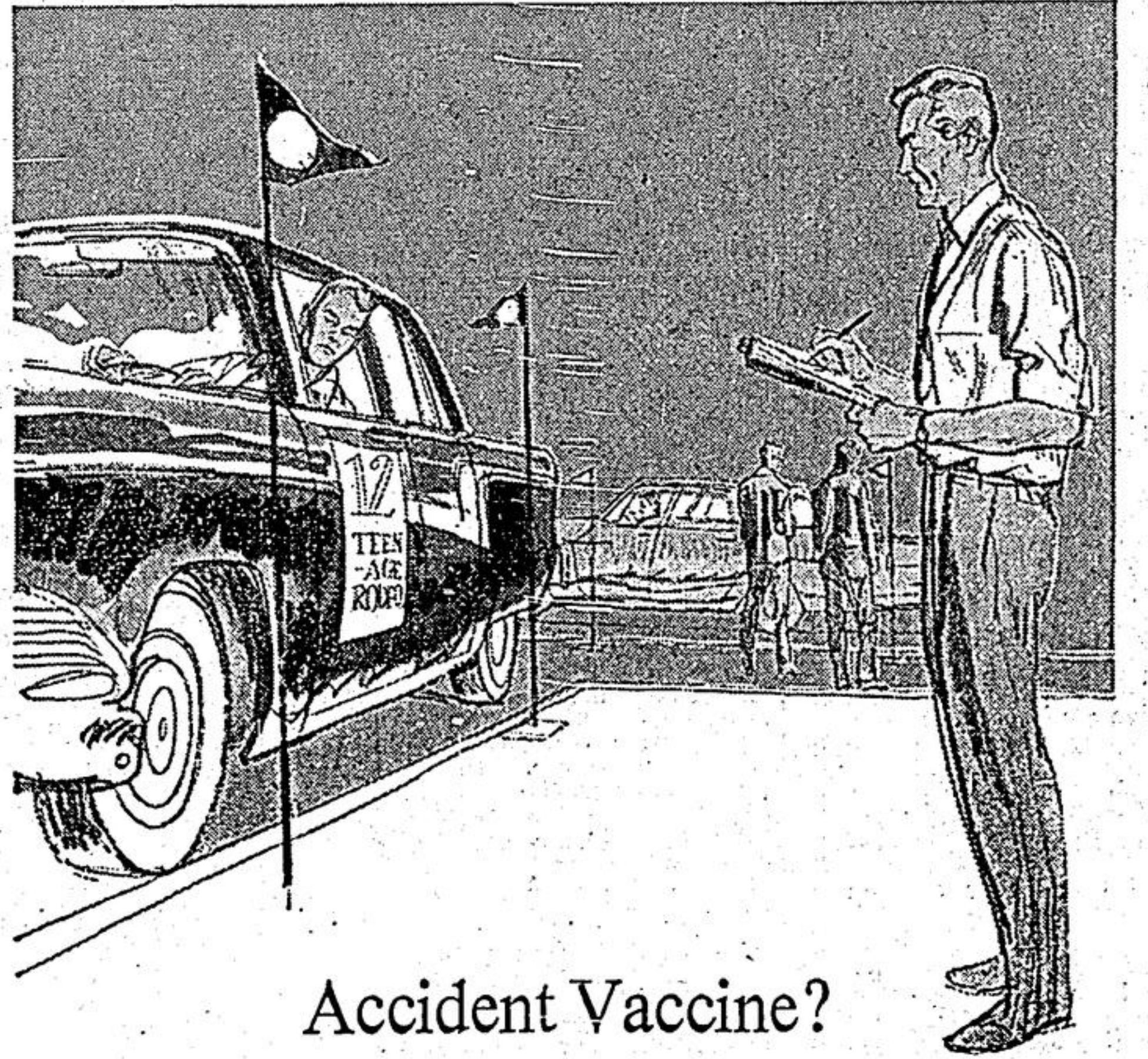
