Sunday School Lesson

Golden Text: The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein.—Psalm 24:1.

Approach to the Lesson

This is the first of a series of lessons that are, in the words of those who choose the subjects, "designed to show that there is a distinctively Christian way of life which is often in sharp contrast to the prevailing attitudes and actions among men." It shows the Christian as a person with a God-given relationship with this universe and the people who inhabit it, for no man lives to himself or dies to himself (Rom. 14:7). It is vitally important that we understand that our salvation is not an exultation and missionary endeavor (really one outreach of the church, not two) are neglected by many professing Christians whose concept of the church is that it exists for their personal comfort.

Our lesson today is taken from one of the most majestic passages of Scripture that rises to its culmination in the well-known words with which Isaiah 40 concludes: "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall walk and not faint." But what sort of God is He upon whom we wait? Until we have answered that question satisfactorily, the beauty of the words will continue to make their appeal to us, but the glorious experience of which they speak will remain unknown.

Our lesson for today takes a very small section of this magnificent chapter in order to focus our attention on the fact that this is God's universe, created and sustained by Him for His purposes, and controlled through the laws which He has established. When we understand who He is, we shall the more eagerly wait upon Him in order to renew our strength. As Dr. G. H. Morrison has said: "This restorative power of waiting upon God depends primarily on what God is. A friend will come into our sickroom, and when he leaves, everything is different. We feel better—we can laugh again. It is not what our friend has said that makes the difference. It is the mysterious power of personality. It is thus that there comes a renewal of our strength when the presence of God is realized. Where He is, abounding life is, and that life is overflowing into us. The restorative medicine is Himself."

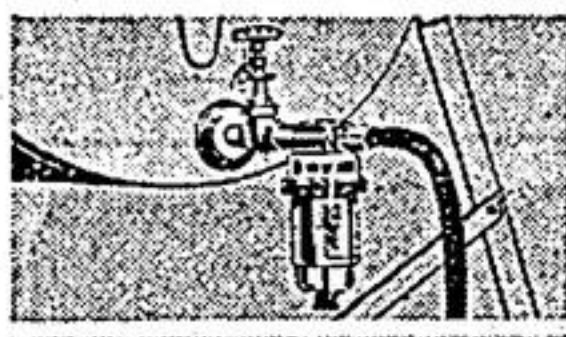

Hospital Asks Funds

The Cottage Hospital of Uxbridge, planning a \$500,000 20-bed addition is requesting an assistant grant from Ontario County.

The Hospital Board asked early this month that \$292,500, or 75 per cent of the balance of the costs after subtraction of Provincial and Federal grants, be paid from County funds.

A public subscription to raise the remainder of the balance will be launched shortly and is expected to reach its mark of \$97,500 this fall.

In an earlier letter to Council the Hospital Board requested Council to "seriously consider adding one half mill to its present levy" to enable payment of a grant to their building project in 1965 and 1966.
