Ringwood Rearguard Wins Scoring Title McInnis Is Leading Playoff Performer

It is seldom that a defence-man moves to the forefront of the scoring parade but in the current playoffs of the Stouffville Community League, Ringwood rearguard, Doug McInnis has turned in an amazing point-scoring effort.

In five games to date, he has collected a total of 3 goals and 9 assists for 12 points, the best out of 46 players who have figured in the statistics. He shares the top spot with Ringwood forward, Barry McLean who has 7 goals and 5 assists.

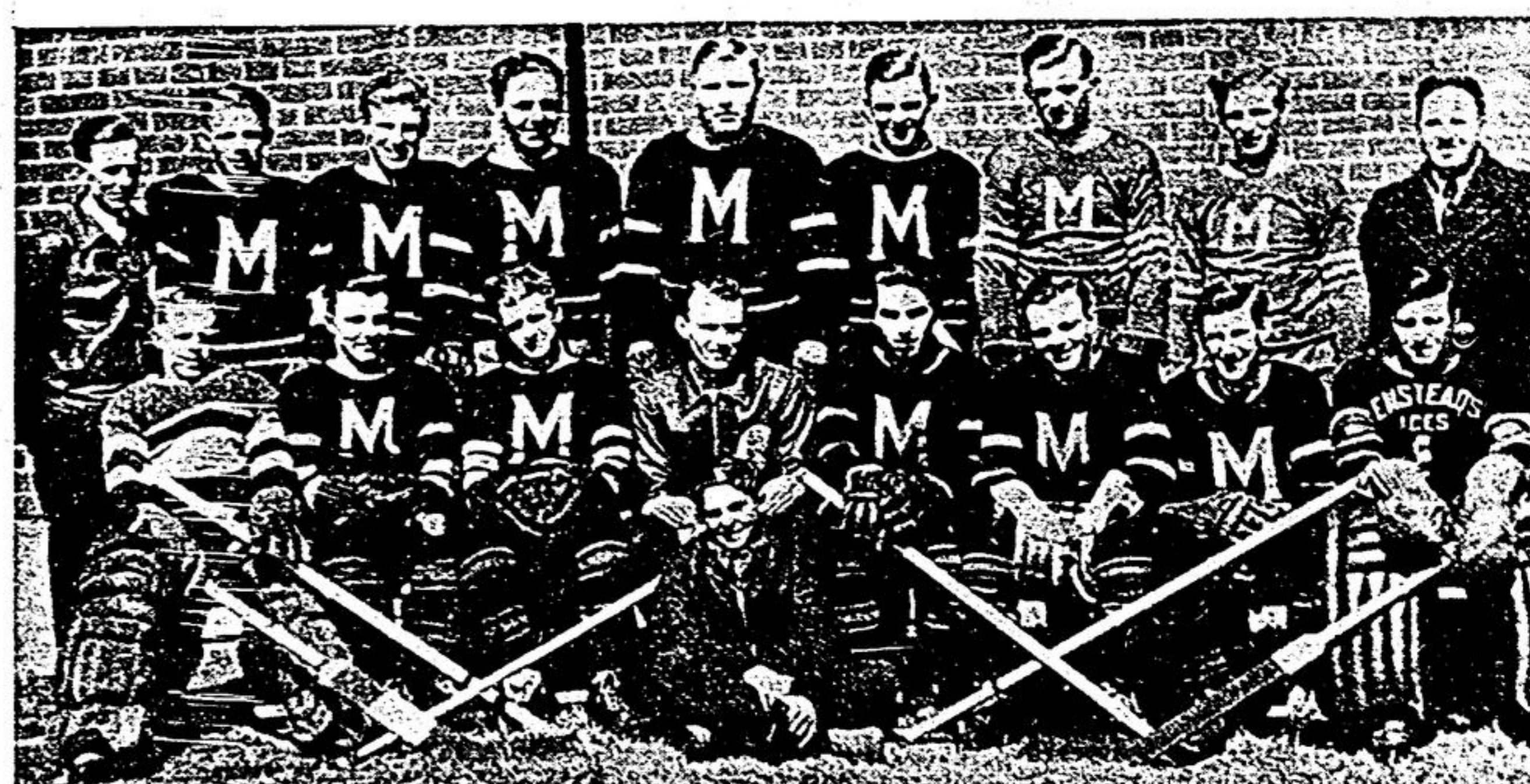
