Markham Building Over \$400,000

There were 27 new homes started in Markham Township with a total value of \$395,500. The building inspector's report showed that permits were issued for \$22,500 in additions and renovations, while the value of accessory buildings was \$9,000. Total value of building in March was \$437,680, which included an \$8,000 addition to a commercial building, an oil storage tank and a sign.
