





## Unionville **Plebiscite**

(Continued from Front)

Mr. Ewart Stiver said he had visions that one day Unionville might become an incorporated village. He suggested that altho the three trustees had limited powers, they could still exert more influence than a single ward representative. "From what I have heard, I am still not convinced that our village should become part of the twp," he said. He suggested that the present agreement between the village and the township with respect to road construction was not practical and should be renegotiated. He urged that some road work should be done in the north end of the village but suggested that back-street paving could wait until more funds were available in the future.

Township Clerk, Mr. H. T. C. Crisp said that, in his opinion, Unionville was much too small to become an incorporated village and suggested further that police villages were no longer. considered practical. He said that even the Vilage of Markham with 5,000 population could not be considered an ec-

onomical unit. Ratepayer Milton Findlay Unionville suggested that should have its own representative on the council if it became

part of the township again. Mr. Frank Roberts suggested that the village should be guaranteed that the fire brigade unit would remain regardless of any change.
