

"Clippers" Thump Wellington 8-3; Advance To Ontario Junior 'D' Finals

A sustained barrage of shots on the Wellington net (38 in all) paid off with 8 goals on Monday night as the Stouffville "Clippers" subdued Wellington three games to 1 to earn a shot at the Ontario Junior "D" Title. Only the Hensall-Zurich "Combiners" now stand between Stouffville and a Provincial Championship. The series opener was at Hensall on Wednesday with the second contest in Stouffville on Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m.

It was Stouffville all the way on Monday as they hammered home 3 goals in the 1st period; 4 in the 2nd and 1 in the 3rd. The team was shooting more and shooting hard, a problem that had plagued their efforts in some previous contests. In the opening period alone, they levelled 16 drives on the Wellington cage. Glenn Jackson guarded the "Clipper" goal well but unlike his padded rival at the other end of the rink, he didn't have as much to do. Twenty-one shots were driven in his direction.

Perfect Play
Wellington rallied slightly in the middle frame with three goals in five minutes but just at a time it appeared possible that Stouffville might wilt under the

pressure, Barry McLean and Wayne Hassell teamed up for a perfect scoring play. McLean, who finished off the two-man rush, put the "Clippers" out front 5-3 and they never looked back. Bill Corner (his second of the night), Glenn Hooper and Ross Brown finished off the Stouffville scoring spree. Pete Reesor (2) and Rod Kelson were the other "Clipper" marksmen. Don McNeill, Larry McKenzie and Larry Poachman hit the target for Wellington.

Covers No. 7
Coach Geo. Stark assigned forward Glenn Hooper to the job of shadowing Wellington's Don McNeill (No. 7) and he turned in a great effort. McNeill figured in one of his team's 3 goals but his performance was minimized compared with previous games. Hooper, possibly the fastest free-skater on the "Clipper" club found time for his defensive duties to pick up one goal. Ken Aida, Stan Feasby and Barry McLean played exceptionally well. Stouffville ran into a host of penalties that could, under different circumstances turn a victory into a defeat. One of the visitor's tallies came with the homesters two men short.

Research in Colored Road Surfaces

Roads of the not too distant future may be pink, blue or green in color. An evaluation of colored road surfaces is one of the projects on road research in Canada that is currently under study.

In all, some 441 projects in various areas of road research are currently being carried out in Canada or have been completed during the last five years. Subjects range from highway finance to electronic computers to simulate traffic patterns and from the evaluation of electric snow melting installations to five-year licence plates.

If you have been wondering why someone doesn't do something about your pet road peeve, this impressive list of projects will reassure you that something is being done to solve the problems.

The compilation of research projects in progress or completed during the period 1958 to 1963 is the work of Canadian Good Roads Association's Research Correlation Committee. Purpose of the CGRA study is two-fold: (a) to ensure that new developments can be put to use without delay and, (b) to prevent unnecessary and costly duplication of research.

Further improvements depend on research and it is encouraging to know that approximately \$2.1 million was spent directly on road research and development in 1963. Not too many years ago highway research in Canada was almost non-existent.
