\$40,000 Addition Begun For Machine & Tool Plant

The first sods were turned on Tuesday to begin construction on a new \$40,000 addition to the Stouffville Machine and Tool Plant. The cement block and structural steel building will join the present premises on a site located at the rear. It will measure 100 feet long by 52 feet wide. The contractor is Morley Symes of Stouffville. The Veterans' Construction Co. are making the excavation.

The addition has been in the planning stage for some time and will accommodate an extended line of work in the making of the moulds. The plant now has a staff of 28 employees and this number will be nearly doubled when the new contract is completed. It is expected that the structure will be finished in July of this year.

700 Yds. of Cable Found in Field

An estimated 700 yards of cable stolen recently from the plant of Amalgamated Electric Corp. in Markham, has been found in a farm field south of the village.

Children inspecting the site of a ravine on the 3rd conc. of Markham Township on Tuesday, discovered the remains of a skull and took it to school.

A teacher contacted the Richmond Hill police department and the message was relayed to Markham Twp. Officers believe the bones are the remains of an Indian grave.

Feel P. Schools Empty 80% of Time

In an effort to cut down on the cost of education, a resolution passed by the council of the town of Newmarket and approved by the Twp. of Whitchurch will attempt to have present school buildings put to more efficient use. The request will be forwarded to the Minister of Education, Hon. Wm. Davis.

Deputy-Reeve, Ross Farquharson of Whitchurch said that the matter had been introduced within the Education Committee of County Council. It was noted that at present, schools were used only 20% of the time and were vacant during the remaining 80%.

Mr. Farquharson said he had learned that in 14 other countries, greater use was made of existing structures rather than continuing the costly program of erecting new buildings.

New Wage Scale for Top Employees

Markham Township Council which has been deliberating for some weeks on the 1964 wage scale for the township employees, announced the final figures on Monday night.

The salaries for the police department remain unsettled. The department has asked for a two-year plan but council has maintained they can only budget one year at a time. A final offer has been presented to the Police Association and this is being placed before the officers for consideration.

The salaries concluded Monday include, Clerk Harry Crisp \$9,300; Treasurer E. A. Barton \$7,000; Engineer Miklas \$10,000; Planning Director Forrest \$8,600; Deputy-Treas. Shenfield \$6,300; Assessor Thompson \$6,700; Building Inspector Fudge \$6,700 and Police Chief Harvey Cox \$6,800.

The position formerly held by Mr. Harry Crisp included Clerk, Treasurer and Tax Collector. The job has now been divided with Mr. Barton being appointed treasurer. There was considerable discussion over the method of arriving at the salary figures and in the final vote, three members of council supported the scale while Councillor Sloane was opposed and Councillor Chas. Hoover abstained.
