

Clippers "Hang 'em Up" For The Season, Lose 10-7 In Overtime Game

If Coach Geo. Stark is of sane and sound mind after Friday night's Junior "D" playoff final at Hensall then his nerves must be made of steel. In possibly the wildest hockey contest in the annals of O.H.A. history, Stouffville dropped a 10-7 game to conclude their puck-chasing activities for the season. Hensall took the series and the title 4 games to 1.

In an effort to indicate the trend of the play, an almost unbelievable see-saw battle, Stouffville led 3-0 at the 14:20 mark of the 1st period. At 5:39 of the 3rd period, Hensall moved out front by a score of 7-3. Five minutes later, 10:30 the "Clippers" had pulled back on even terms and the score read 7-7 forcing both teams into overtime. Hensall wrapped up the championship with three goals in five minutes of the extra session.

Glenn Hooper fired a 3-goal hat-trick for Stouffville. Singles came from the sticks of Bob Mustard, Ross Brown, Barry McLean and Rod Kelson. Bruce Cooper and Bob Livermore each collected three for Hensall. Michael Cushman potted a pair. Dennis Morrissey and Gord Chapman each notched one.

The trophy was presented to Hensall team captain, Bruce Horton by Donald Budeo, O.H.A. representative.

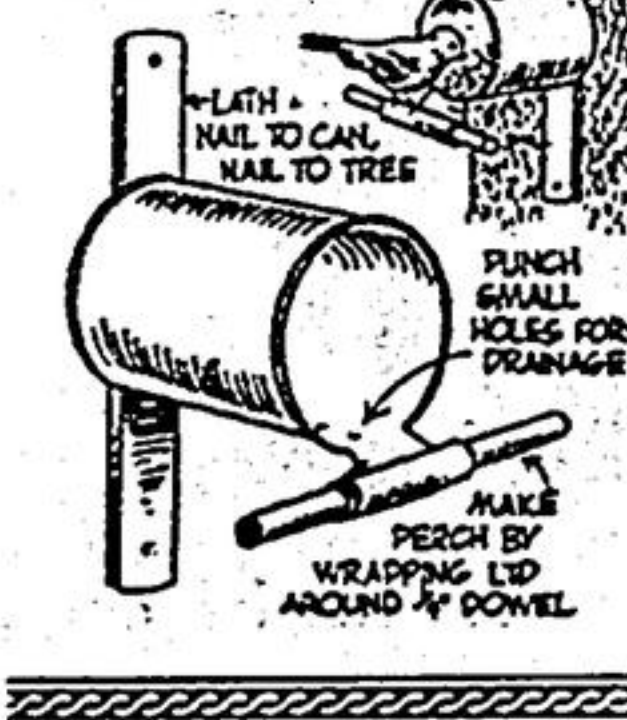
