### "Priceless" Stallion Is Highly Prized By Owner Betty Rae Of Unionville

"Ace," a new-born stallion colt, is the pride of the Double R. Stables, owned and operated by Betty Rae of Unionville. The frisky little lad was born last week at Markham, the son of champion stock. The mother is a registered American saddle horse, Marble Hall Carmelita (Lady). The father is Captain Fury. The colt's registered nameplate is Captain's Ace High.

The mare has won every award in the book and its offspring shows every indication of breeding excellence. At only nine days old and still a little unsure on its long, lean legs, he's worth more than \$3,000 to his affectionate owner, in fact, "Ace," is just not for sale.

Thirty Years Experience

To Betty Rae, horses are almost human. In competition under her guiding rein, their intelligence cannot be questioned. Dozens of ribbons and awards are proof of their performance. She has been in the horse-training business for over 30 years and now owns a stable of eight with an addition on the way.

The stable in Markham is especially convenient since an adjoining "arena" allows her to work them all winter. Three, including the stallion, Captain Fury, are kept in Unionville. Betty provides riding instruction during the off-season up until June. She then embarks on her swing through points in Ontario and the United States,

showing either for herself or for other owners. This summer she will attend State Fairs in Syracuse (New York); Detroit (Michigan) and Ottawa. She contends that the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto is the most competitive. "That's where you see the best in the business," she says.

A Career

Betty is marking her sixth year as a professional. She is the first to admit that her business has advanced far beyond the hobby stage. "It's a career," she said. In 1963, she captured championships in the saddle horse and palomino classes with a reserve champion in the Arabian. "One can be a professional in name but the true test is in producing quality," she said. Betty has achieved both goals with a stable full of proof to back it up.

### What's Doing At The Roxy

This picture could be more appropriately titled PARIS WHEN IT FIZZLES, because it is an attempt at humour which hopelessly fails. The story has William Holden as a hard-drinking but likable guy who is boozing it up in Paris, instead of writing a book he is contracted to do. Suddenly he gets the good word from the boss, who wants a masterpiece turned out in just 48 hours. Luckily, Audrey Hepburn is his secretary; these two combine to dream up every plot conceivable, and include it in the masterpiece? Many of the sequences thus derived are actually performed by the couple.

The vampire scene, the great bank robbery, the girl who stole the Eiffel Tower, Male spy vs. Female spy, etc. Sounds funny? Alas, but it's not. The gimmicks are so worn out that this rehashing of old cabbage becomes a big bore: You have seen or heard every single gag and joke before, and here they are told so poorly.

**NIGHT MUST FALL** and **THE PASSWORD IS COURAGE** — Very Good

After his tremendous success of TOM JONES and SATUR-

**DAY NIGHT AND SUNDAY MORNING**, Albert Finney forms his own company to remake NIGHT MUST FALL, the story of a psycho-killer who delights in tormenting old ladies. This story has neither the depth or scope of his earlier performances, and Finney occasionally falls into the trap of overacting. Nevertheless, the tale is engrossingly told, with a pace which is often harrowing.

**THE PASSWORD IS COURAGE** is a marvellous film. It tells the story of Charles Coward, who refused to live up to his name; Charlie is a British officer in a German prisoner of war camp, and he spent hours tormenting his captors, helping others escape, and generally raising hell. This opus is told with a slice of humour, and it is very enjoyable to watch. If you saw James Robertson Justice in Very Important Person, you know just how funny a prisoner of war story can be, and this one is just as good. Dirk Bogard plays Charlie, and he has amiable romantic help from a pretty Polish girl on the "outside," and valuable assistance from a wise-acre friend on the "inside." Don't miss it.
