groups and service clubs asking their opinion. Of this large number only 200 were returned and of these seventy percent declared that they did not believe there was any problem. From this survey, the department took the view that, if a problem did exist, it was a minority problem.

However, Mr. Coon said that complaints continued to come in to Queen's Park resulting in the formation of the special committee of which he is a member. All publications about which complaints are received, are directed to this committee which will ascertain whether or not it considers the material obscene according to the Criminal Code. Mr. Coon said that the definition provided in the Criminal Code by Mr. Davey Fulton in 1959, takes the line that sex must be exploited as a dominating characteristic, to be considered as coming under the term obscene. There was no further concern about who read the publications as heretofore. Mr. Coon agreed that the present Criminal Code definition was not ideal.

Lady Chatterley Passed
Mr. Coon told the members that the material arrives at his office in varying amounts from time to time. He mentioned specifically "Lady Chatterley," about which there was considerable publicity some time ago. He said that the book was not considered obscene and did not unduly exploit sex. There was a ban placed on the book in Quebec but a Supreme Court of Canada ruling freed the book by a 5 to 4 majority. Some magazines, he related, were considered risqué, but not obscene, and this he pointed out was a change in general public thinking over the past few years.

Teenagers Not Affected
In speaking of who should read these "shady" magazines and who should not, Mr. Coon said he did not agree that teenagers were affected. He said that actually a teenager could look at such books and throw them away easier than adults. "After all," he said, "we cannot design our libraries around what a 14-year-old boy would read, but on the other hand it doesn't mean that we should allow everything through."

Mr. Coon pointed out that the committee was not favourable to books dealing with torture, particularly of females. He believed the sadistic approach was dangerous. He mentioned a large number of magazines emanating out of Montreal featuring the thrills of a man turning himself into a woman. "This is a disease, but the publishers know that it had readership for a certain class and they exploit it," he said. Homosexuality was another item which he said was exploited, and the old idea of blaming the whole idea of obscenity on the Communists.

Terrible to Ban a Book
Mr. Coon concluded by saying that he believed it was a terrible thing to have to ban a book just because of someone's opinion. He likened it to doing away with a man.

"People," he said, "should not panic over obscenity but work quietly in dealing with it." He said the best way to fight it was definitely through education, not censorship.

Cherry Cream Squares

Makes 9 servings
Combine crumbs, brown sugar and butter. Press half mixture in bottom of buttered 9-inch square pan. Sprinkle gelatine over water; let stand 5 mins. to soften and dissolve over hot water; Cool. Cream cheese; gradually beat in icing sugar, lemon rind and juice. Blend gelatine into stiffly-whipped cream; fold into cheese mixture. Spread half cream mixture over crumbs in cake pan. Carefully spread cherry filling on top. Add remaining cheese mixture and sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture. Chill and serve cut in squares.
