1964 dog tags are available only at the Clerk's Office, Goodwood, and are on sale now. Avoid additional penalty — get yours today.

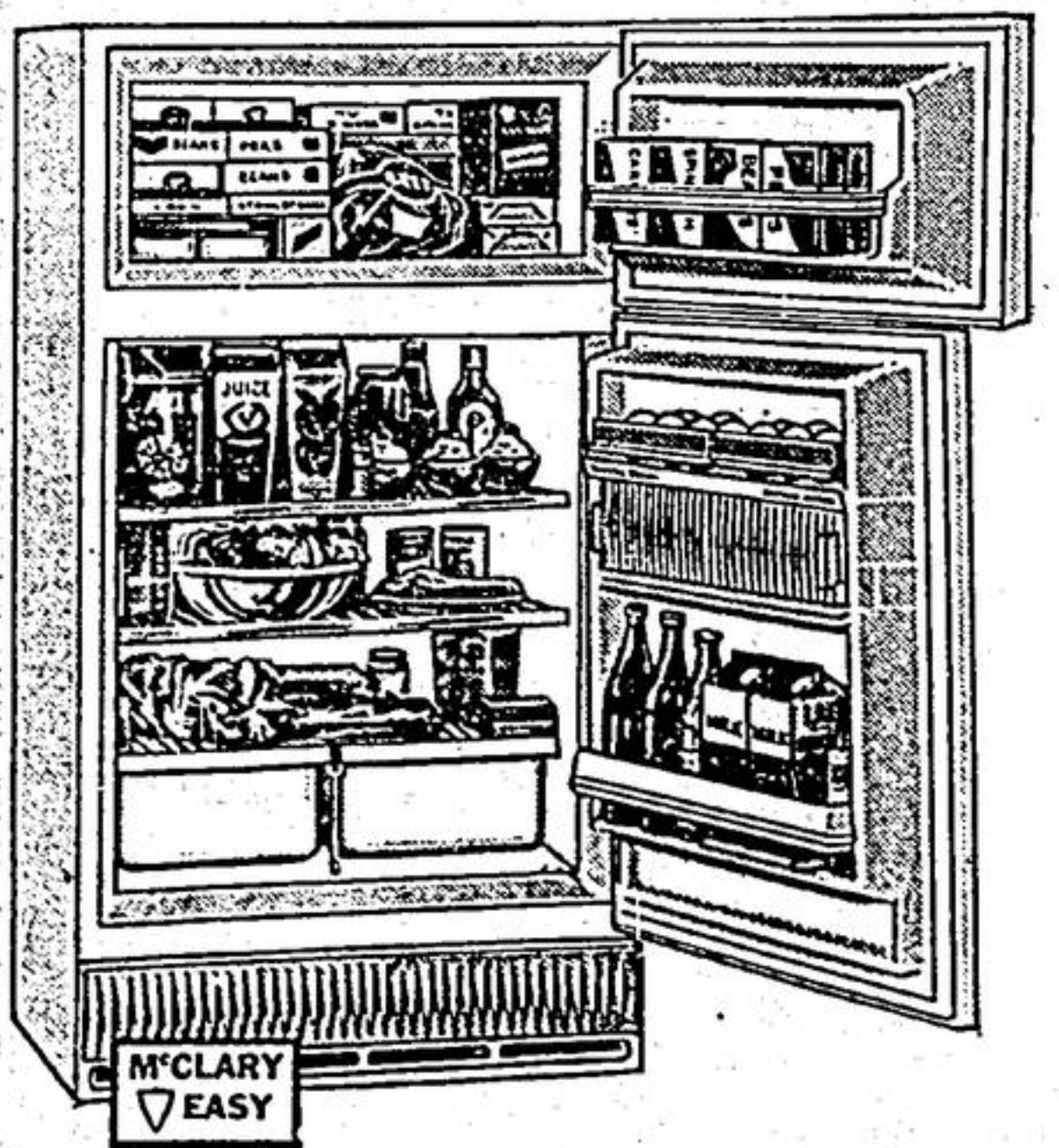
