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# Your M.P. Reports

The Municipal Winter Works has been proven to be a successful program undertaken by the municipalities of Canada. This program was introduced in the fall of 1952 and has grown larger and more productive since.  
In spite of the six weeks curtailment it has, in the past winter, produced part-time jobs for some 161,000 Canadians.  
The municipalities have done a good housekeeping job in selecting projects with a high labour content. The average percentage of payroll cost to total cost was 35 percent.  
The Federal Government pays 50 percent of the labour cost and the Province of Ontario pays an additional 25 percent of cost involved in labour. One Province pays an additional 40 percent, leaving the cost of labour to the Municipality of need for the plan and the Department of Citizenship and Immigration acts as a Province would on their behalf. They undertook and completed some 73 projects and provided employment for 1,297 men on Indian Reserves where these projects

were undertaken.  
The estimated costs of all projects was \$276 thousand. This of course includes material and labour. The labour cost amounted to approximately \$97,000 to which the Federal Government contributed some \$52,000.  
Winter after winter the municipalities have realized the value of this program and their numbers participating have increased appreciably. Since 1952 this program has generated over \$1 billion worth of projects and has provided work for more than half a million Canadians at a time when many of them would have been unemployed.  
There are not many items under Government Orders appearing on the program to be dealt with by Parliament. The Pension Act is dormant awaiting the constitutional amendment so we are unable to deal with it. The Bill on Redistribution has been withdrawn from debate in the House and no one seems to know when the Government is prepared to proceed with it.  
There are important amendments to the National Housing Act, but the Government has not introduced them as yet for debate.  
The Estimates have had discussions but only for a short period. The Department of Agriculture has been before the House for a few hours during a period of two days, and the Department of Public Works has had consideration for some

three hours.  
A great deal has yet to be done and Parliament should be quite busy in the days ahead.  
Very useful work is being done in Standing Committees and it is here that progress is being made.

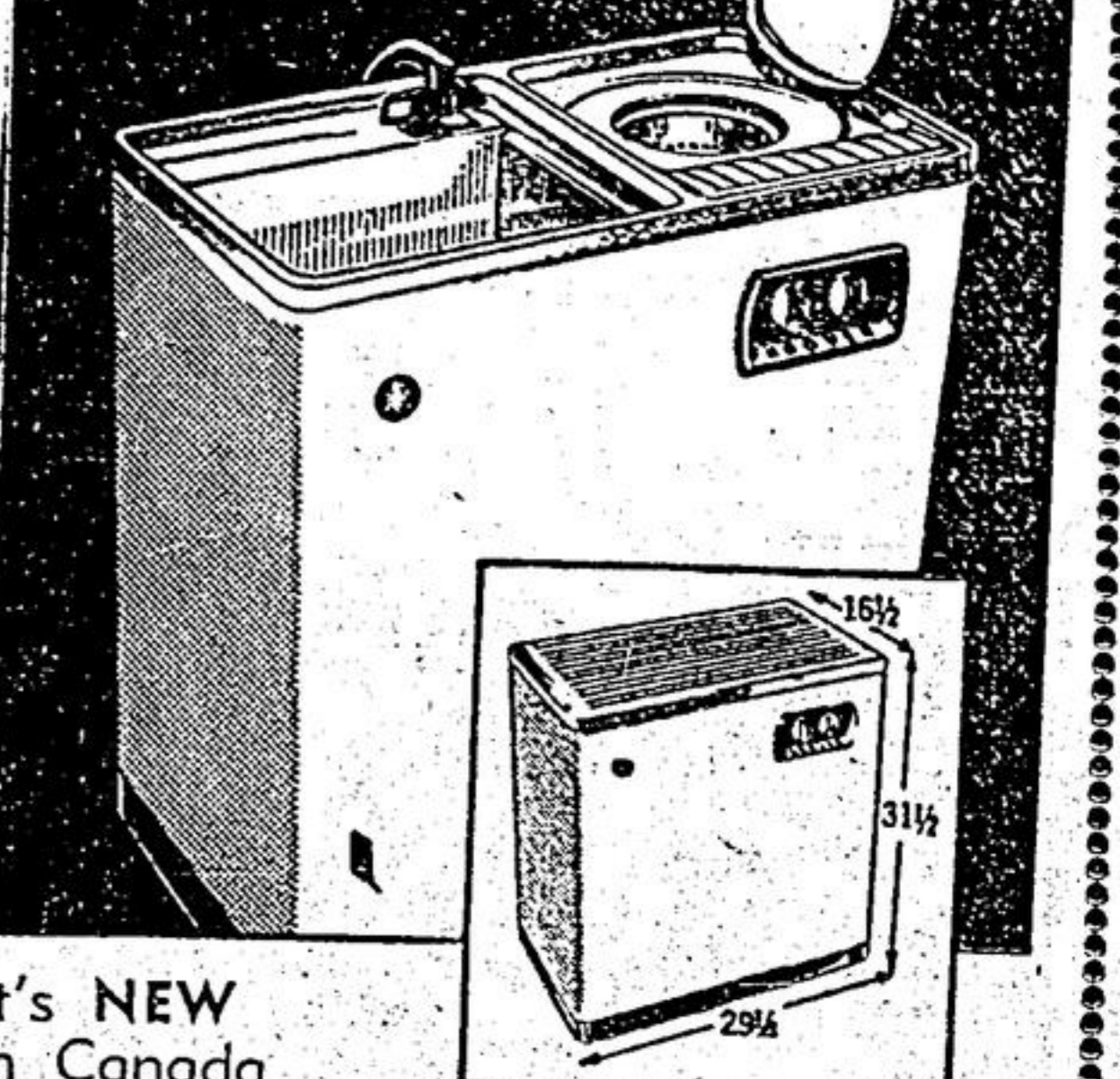
## Getting Ready To Oil Streets

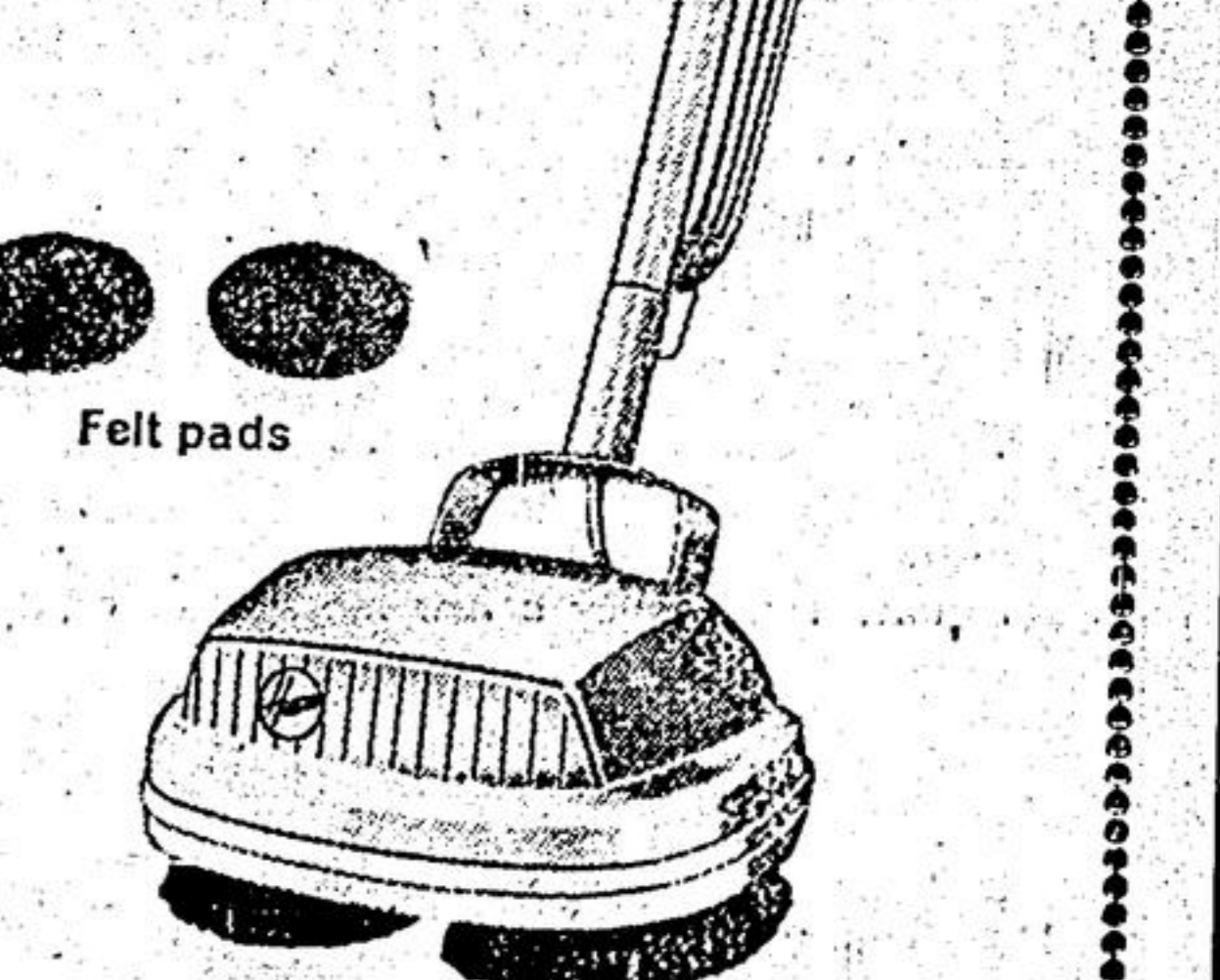
