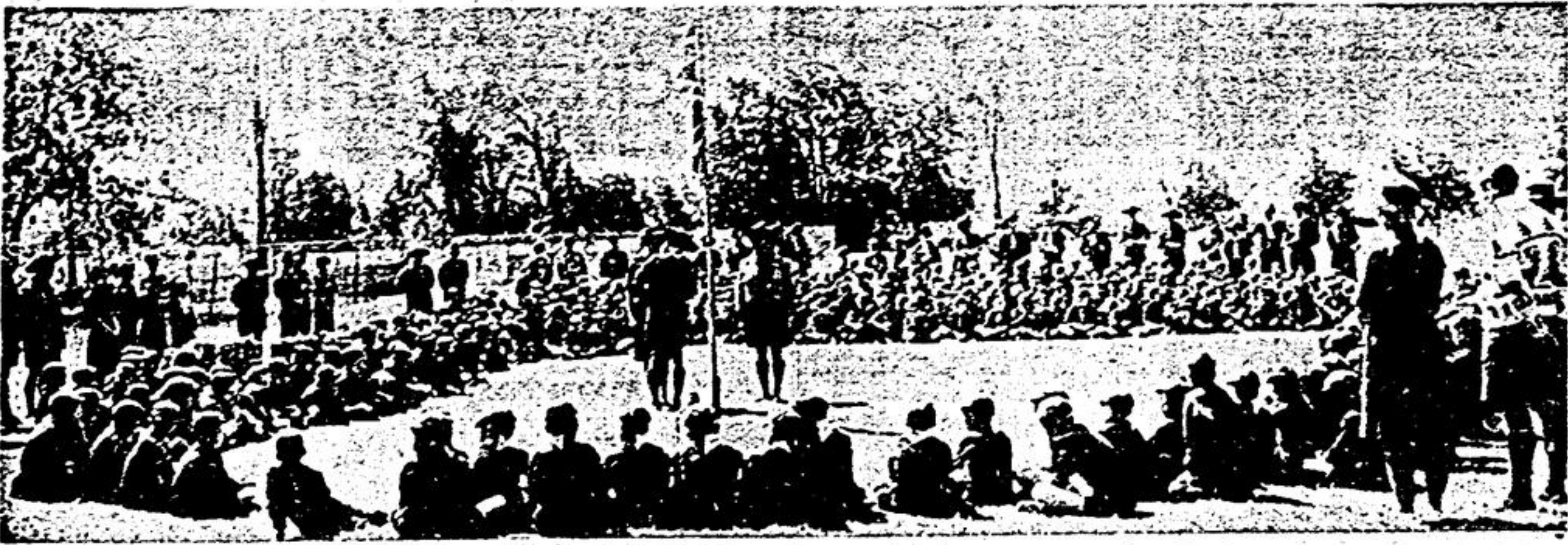


Local And Personal Happenings

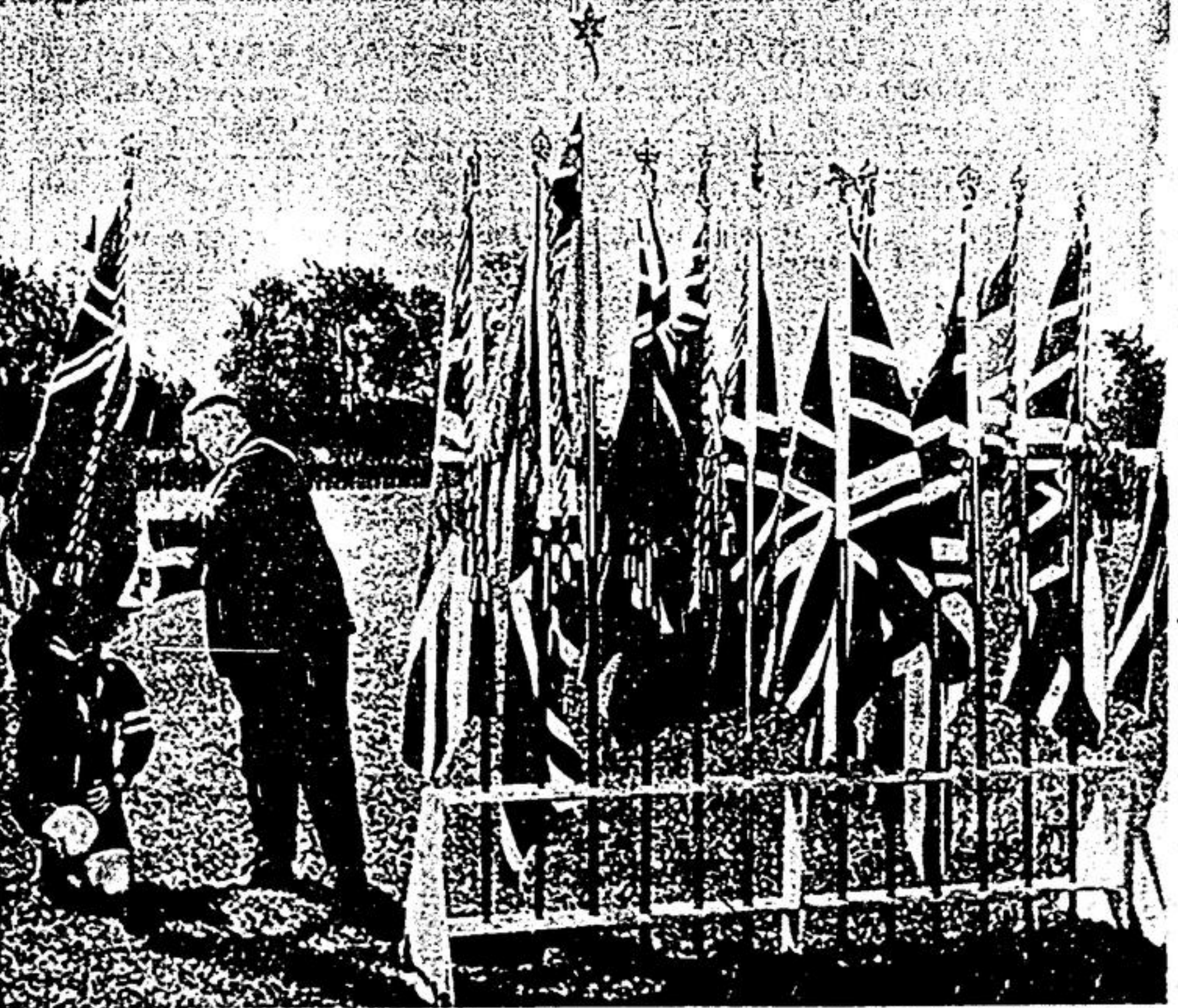
