When the seed drills are finished, the next machine that should go into action is the weed sprayer. In weed spraying we are too often locking the stable after the horse has been stolen. We kill the weeds after they have taken about 90% of the moisture and fertility they

Most of the inquiries I get about weeds come in midsummer. For instance, I have gone out to look at weed problems where chickory, thistles, stinkweed, pigweed and lambs quarters are waist high. They are hard to kill at this stage and the worst of the damage has already been done.

It may be a litle too early to spray grain now, but it is an ideal time to do pastures, fence rows and roughlands. I think a few gallons of 24-D on these areas will pay good dividends.

Time of spraying is crucially important with atrazine on corn. Many failures are caused by being too late. Those who depend on custom sprayers would be beter to spray before the weeds are up, instead of waiting and taking the risk of being late.
