Swimming Classes Begin June 29

The Claremont recreation swimming program will be conducted again this summer at the private pool on the property of Mr. and Mrs. R. Baker, north east of the village. The committee was fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. Marie Neill, a qualified Red Cross Instructor who will assume all duties involved in the project. Lessons will be provided for children from grades 5 to 8 and children, 11 years or older in other grades. Classes will begin on June 29th and continue through to July 17th, except Saturday, Sunday and holidays. The time is from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The time has been increased this season to one hour per lesson and the cost per pupil will be \$2.00. This fee will include ten lessons, transportation to and from the pool and insurance coverage. Beaverton Site Selected For Cty. Home For Aged

Ontario County Council sitting for the last time in the old County building last week decided on the Village of Beaverton as the site for the second Ontario County Home for the Aged.

The new site chosen by Council is a 13-acre parcel of land fronting on Main Street in the village.

The Board gave as its reasons for choosing the site: "It is within easy walking distance of the centre of town, and Lake Simcoe and Beaverton Harbour are near by."

The Board added that the Beaverton Hydro Commission would supply power at a reasonable price and would install transformers and underground wiring at the site.

The Village has an adequate water supply and the water system is serviced by a 100,000 gallon storage tank, virtually ruling out the possibility of a lack of water in an emergency.

He asked if he could talk to Crown Attorney Bruce Ailcock and was told he could do so if he waited a few minutes.

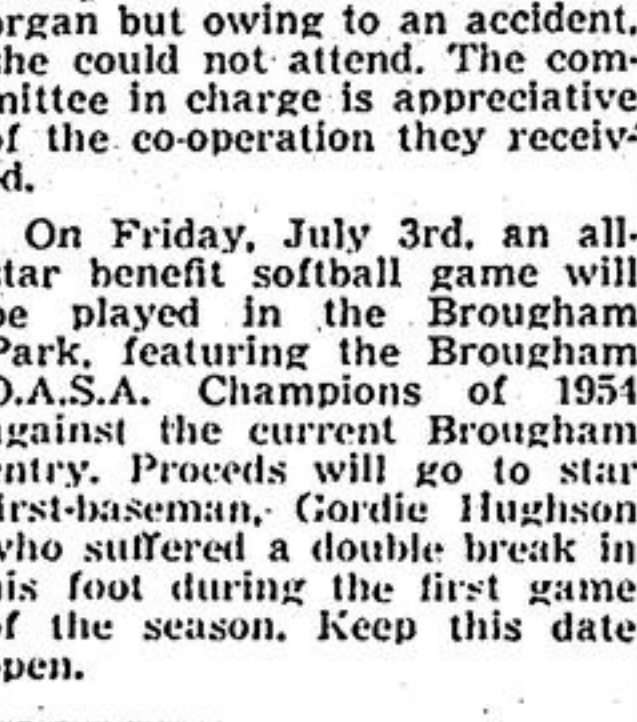

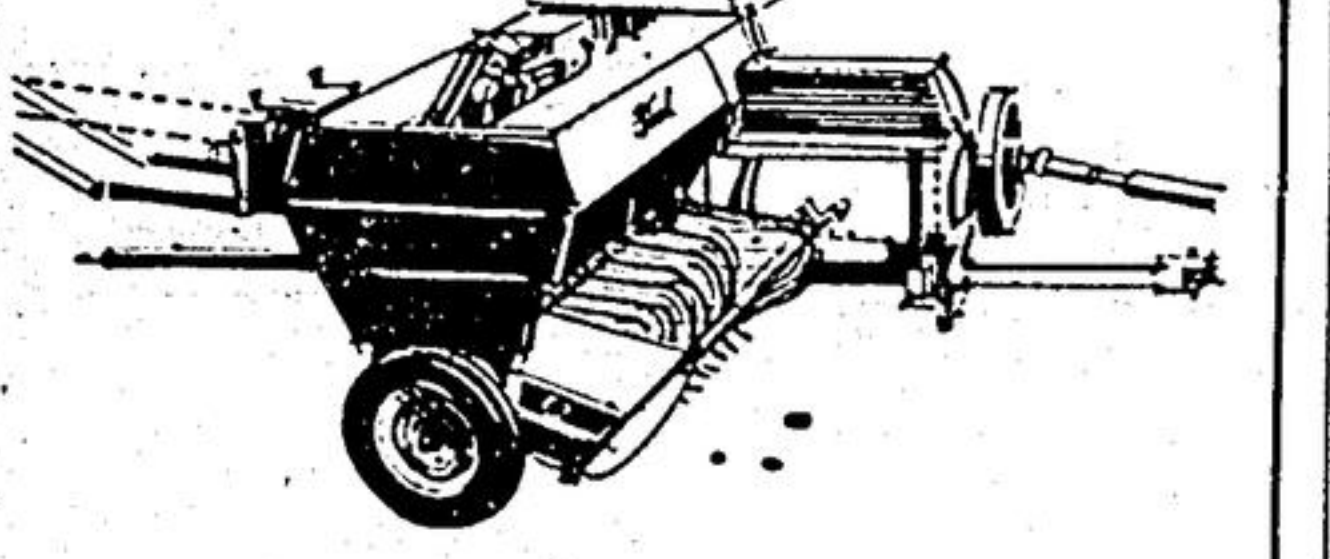
