

## On The Farm Front...

(A. A. Wall, Agricultural Representative, York County) EUGENE LEMON FARM SITE OF SOYBEAN CROP PROJECT OF YK. CTY

We have another project going this year on growing soybeans. We probably should give up on this crop in York County. We have never been able to get satisfactory yields although farmers have tried them here many times.

We keep trying though, because this crop has so much potential in a county like York. Our need for protein is so great for dairy cattle, beef cattle, hogs and poultry, that if we could grow some of it ourselves it would strengthen our whole livestock industry.

One of the main problems has been weed control. Income from the crop does not justify row cultivation. If weeds are allowed to grow, yield suffers badly. We are trying a new method with chemicals this year on Eugene Lemon's Farm at Stouffville.

The seed bed was prepared first and then left for about two weeks. In this time weed growth got well started. The beans were then planted without any cultivation. Right after planting, the field was sprayed with Amine Dinitro, a chemical that kills all vegetation. The beans are up nicely now, and they should keep well ahead of late germinating weeds. This system is called planting on a stale seedbed. We hope it works because it might mean that we are a little closer to soybeans being a practical crop here.

Our old friend the oat nematode has showed up in several places this year. One field I have seen will be almost a complete loss. The damage shows up in patches, where the grain is a very poor colour and quite obviously stunted. There is no practical treatment for it. The only answer is to stop growing oats on affected fields.

Where the infestation is not too serious, an oat barley mixture will do fairly well, but yields will be seriously affected
