Orchard Park Wins By 18 Pts.; Seven Records Fall, Three Tied

Seven new records were set and three others were tied at a highly competitive track and field meet between students of Summitview and Orchard Park Public Schools on Tuesday of last week. Originally scheduled for Monday, the events had to be postponed due to inclement weather. The track entries were held in the morning on the grounds at the High School with the afternoon field events at Orchard Park.

Carol Heatherington of Orchard Park, the Intermediate girl's champion, was the top individual point-scorer with 30. She snapped the existing record in the high jump with a mark of 4'11". Ben Aida of Summitview was the Sr. "B" boy's champion with 23 points. He broke no less than three records in the running broad (46'18"), hop, step and jump (34'10") and standing broad (8'). Jody Holden won the honors in the Intermediate boy's class. He is a pupil at Summitview. Wayne Jackson of Orchard Park took the Sr. "A" division for the boys. Both rolled up a total of 23 points. The Senior girl's title went to Lynn McCaffrey of Summitview with 19 points. Junior honours went to Judy McCaffrey of Summitview and Bill Hassard of Orchard Park, each with 14 points. Other records were established by Larry Plaskitt of Orchard Park in the Sr. "B" high jump (4'10"); John Chown of Orchard Park in the Intermediate baseball distance throw (165'); and Gayle Plaskitt in the Int. girl's broad jump (12'6"). Athletes who tied existing records included Judy Churchill; Bob Couse and Michael Wilkins. In total points per school, Orchard Park rolled up 298 to 280 for Summitview.

Hilarious "Hillbillies" Delight Crowd; Watson - Lyons Win Ring Feature

Saturday night's wrestling performance in the Stouffville Arena was, without doubt, the finest show of ring gymnastics ever displayed here. The acrobatics of the "Scufflin' Hillbillies" was in itself worth the price of admission. In addition, the card presented "Whipper" Billy Watson and Billy "Red" Lyons against that hairy masterpiece of humanity known as The Beast and his unscheduled mate, Mike Valentino.

Watson, who in the past has put on some pretty mediocre exhibitions here, never looked better than on Saturday. At times, during this feature match, bodies were flying around the ring at such a rate that one had difficulty in keeping up with the pace. Valentino, built something like a brick house, took a torrid beating and at the final bell, was lathered in perspiration. The Beast, not so agile as his partner, gave both Watson and Lyons a hard time, mostly through the use of a rib-crushing bear hug. Much to the approval of the 700 fans, the villains were the losers in both the semi-final and final rounds. Ike Eakins and Tarzan Tyler were disqualified when their illegal tactics against the "Hillbillies" aroused the ire of the referee.

Switch In Plans
Watson was originally scheduled to fight The Beast and his Manager in a handicap match but, due to "ill health", manager

Martina Angelo failed to appear. As a replacement, Valentino agreed to fill out the partnership. "Whipper", after viewing that combination, refused to continue unless he too, could acquire a formidable assistant. Lyons, already changed into his street clothes after a preliminary match, agreed to return. The rough and tumble tactics that followed had the fans on their feet. Valentino was "air-born" throughout much of the match as both Watson and Lyons took delight in flinging him against the ropes like a lead balloon.

Use Their Feet
Garbed in a well-washed pair of overalls, the "Hillbillies" danced a jig around the ring that had the audience roaring with delighted approval. For much of their three-fall affair, they had their feet stuck in the face of either Eakins or Tyler and, frustrating as it was, there was little defence for such tactics. In the realm of brute strength, there was no comparison between the teams, but the Hillbillies kept their opponents at leg's length throughout much of the match.

Stouffville police were on constant patrol around the ring but in spite of this, one over-zealous fan climbed up on the mat apron and received the broadside of Eakin's arm across the head. He ventured forward no further.

NEW CONS. AREA

A master development plan for creation of a 1,350 acre multi-use conservation area on the northwestern outskirts of Metro Toronto has been approved by a joint meeting of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's conservation areas advisory board and the flood control and water conservation advisory board.

The proposed area, tentatively known as the Clairville conservation area would lie between No. 7 highway and Steeles Ave. and would be developed in three stages with the first stage expected to be completed sometime in 1967.

It would be the largest of the Authority's areas which are being developed on lands acquired for flood control purposes. Largest area now in use is the Boyd area near Woodbridge which has about 1,000 acres.

Nucleus of the Clairville area is the Clairville dam and reservoir on the west branch of the Humber river, first of 13 dams to be built by the conservation authority as part of a 10-year flood control and water conservation program being undertaken by the federal and provincial governments and the Authority.

The dam is hastening towards completion and it is planned that the official opening ceremonies will be held on Sept. 17. The dam will also provide a 120-acre lake for recreation purposes.

The Clairville conservation area when completed will be able to accommodate 18,000 persons at one time with parking for 4,000 cars, 2,000 of which will be parked at the beach area. It is planned to have two entrances to the area, one at the highway No. 7 and the other off highway No. 50.

Features of the proposed area will include a visitor's information centre, winter sports area, riding trails, group camping facilities, family and group picnic areas, a beach area that will be capable of accommodating 9,000 persons at a time; boating facilities and dock with 100 rowboats and canoes available; lake fishing and stream fishing areas, pedestrian walkway and trail systems, roads and parking reforestation areas, farm crop demonstration area, wetland ecology area, bathhouses and meadow lands.

It is expected that the overall cost of the area's development will be \$2,680,000.

In addressing the two advisory boards regarding the proposed area, Authority chairman Dr. G. Ross Lord noted that its development would be a long-term project carried out over a number of years and financed within the Authority's budget. Each stage of the area should be completed before opening that particular phase of development to the public, he added.

Keevil Pushes Tie-Breaking Run Home In See-saw Battle

A moment of indecision by Pickering first-baseman, Wayne Wells, on Thursday night cost them a ball game or at least a split in the points. With Claremont's Bruce Norton parked on 3rd, Bill Keevil bounced a slow-roller inside the 1st base line. Wells fielded the ball but made no play on either Norton or Keevil. The lead runner crossed the plate to snap an 11-11 tie with two out in the final inning. Claremont took the see-saw battle 12-11.

It was a hit-crazy game and four pitchers were dressed into action. Claremont started with Bob Redshaw who yielded to Frank Hendy. Jack Stokes was the Pickering starter with Bob Carlisle in relief.

The outcome of the contest was in doubt until the very end as the clubs locked back and forth for the lead. Larry Vernon's home run blast in the 2nd inning made it 3-2 for Claremont. Jim Closs of Pickering clouted a double to score Don Rowe in the 3rd and make it 3-3. Bruce Norton, a hero in the Claremont lineup ripped a two-base blow into the outfield in the 4th and scored on Bob Schram's fly to right and again Claremont moved one run ahead.

Hendy Takes Over
Pickering's big bats came into play in the 3rd and again in the 4th and they piled up, what appeared to be a comfortable lead. Claremont were not to be denied, however, and the combination of Vernon and Norton belted the ball hard in a 5-run rally. Bill Maxwell was also an important cog in the Claremont plate offensive. He slammed a triple. Frank Hendy took charge of the mound chores.

Pickering found themselves trailing by one run in the 7th. Bob Carlisle was sent in as a relief batsman and promptly poked out a single. Britton came through with a double and the score was deadlocked at
