The new owner is Mr. George White and he obtained a permit from Markham Twp Council on Monday. He said he intended to handle a number of steel products as well as lumber.



> Crab grass which is now growing in lawns may still be controleld by the use of a post em-ergent herbicide. Botanists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture suggest applying Pot-assium Cyanate on crab grass which has made some growth.
> Apply when the crab grass heads out, and again about two to three weeks later. Although the old growth will become discolored a week to ten days after treatment, the new growth will be unaffected.
