

Local Athlete Qualifies For Canadian Olympic Trials Held At Montreal

Sixteen year old Susan Nigh, conc. 7, Markham soared to a height of 5'2" on Saturday at Hamilton to qualify as an entry in the Canadian Olympic Trials to be held at Montreal next month. Susan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Nigh and a grade 13 student at Markham Dist. High School.

A recent member of Lloyd Percival's famed Don Mills Track Club, Susan placed 2nd in her class at the Ontario Championships held at Civic Stadium. It was not her best high jump mark, however. In high school competition at McMaster University, Hamilton in May, she chalked up a student record with a mark of 5'3".

This Saturday, Susan will compete at Peterboro and on July 24 and 25 she will take part in the Eastern Canada competitions in Prince Edward Island.

For her fine showing at Hamilton last Saturday, Susan was presented with a silver medal. Should Susan qualify at the Olympic Trials in Montreal in August she will be selected as a Canadian entry in the World Olympics in Tokyo, Japan.

ALLOW SALVAGE YARD AT GORMLEY

The property on the Don Mills Rd., on the east side south of Gormley which has been a topic of discussion at a number of council meetings due to its appearance is to be established as a proper licensed salvage yard. A light board fence, six feet high will be erected around the property and a number of buildings erected.

The new owner is Mr. George White and he obtained a permit from Markham Twp Council on Monday. He said he intended to handle a number of steel products as well as lumber.

Councillor Palmer said he was opposed to salvage yards in any location. Reeve Hooper drew attention to the fact that this particular property was already being used for this purpose and had been prior to the passing of any bylaw.

Council approved the application with deputy-reeve Rumble and councillor Sloane being opposed.

ANNOUNCE LOCAL SWIM PROGRAM

On Monday, over two hundred children from Stouffville and area registered at the Pool for swim instruction. The program, under the direction of Red Cross Instructor Ron Patrick, offers awards to children of all ages. Children under 13 years are eligible for Red Cross Beginner, Junior and Intermediate awards, and children 13 years and over are eligible for these as well as the Senior award. In the Royal Life Saving Society award system those under 15 years are eligible for the Elementary Intermediate and Bronze awards, and those over 15 years, a bar to the Bronze Med., those over 16 years, the Award of Merit and those over 17 years the Award of Distinction.

The teaching staff, composed of accomplished local swimmers, include Anna May Sanders, Frances Farr, Jim Hill and Jim Daniels, all of whom are Red Cross Water Leaders and have Bronze Meds., and/or Awards of Merit. Miss Bernadine Terwoerds, a holder of a Bronze medal, Award of Merit and Award of Distinction, recently obtained the Red Cross Instructor Award and will be assisting Ron in the 6 week program.

Those interested in registering for Royal Life classes for above awards, are asked to sign up at the Pool before Friday, so that classes may begin on Monday, July 13. Red Cross classes began on July 6. Classes are planned for Intermediate, Bronze and Award of Merit candidates, but others may be formed on the basis of those registering.

Crab grass which is now growing in lawns may still be controlled by the use of a post emergent herbicide. Botanists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture suggest applying Potassium Cyanate on crab grass which has made some growth. Apply when the crab grass heads out, and again about two to three weeks later. Although the old growth will become discolored a week to ten days after treatment, the new growth will be unaffected.

This chemical is highly poisonous and should be handled with care.
