A major External Affairs decision faces Canada this fall; should we join the Organization of American States?
The decision is important because it will affect our relations not only with Latin America but, more seriously, with the United States.

What is O.A.S.
The Organization of American States is one of the oldest alliances in modern history. It sprang from a desire among the Latin American Republics for hemispheric unity. In particular, it became associated with the basic principals of the Monroe doctrine.

In the 1923's President Monroe of the United States laid down 3 principals which would be backed up by force, as America's policy towards Europe and Latin America.
1. The New World must remain politically independent from Europe.
2. The New World should recognize law in the place of force.
3. The New World has a community of political ideas.

Thus, the "International Union of the Americas" was organized by the United States to be an alliance of all "republics" in the hemisphere.
Over the years the alliance grew, especially with President Franklin Roosevelt's "Good Neighbour Policy" for Latin America in 1936, and President John Kennedy's "Alliance for Progress" in the 1960's.

of the O.A.S. is important it must be remembered that the organization is specifically designed to "defend the western hemisphere against aggression." It is a regional self-defence organization, like NATO.

Hemispheric Unity
In earlier times the concept of hemispheric unity excluded Canada because all other countries were republics, which had specifically rebelled against monarchy. Canada, on the other hand, was in actual fact, a North American Monarchy, the only Monarchy left in the hemisphere.

Moreover Canada had another handicap in the eyes of O.A.S. republics. It was tied to Europe through the British Empire and the British Commonwealth. Only in recent years have these republics seen Canada as a separate independent state, hence, eligible for membership.

Should We Join
There are four reasons advanced in favour of Canada's membership in O.A.S.:

1. Canada could play a constructive role in international diplomacy in the western hemisphere.
2. New opportunities would develop for closer trading and economic relations with Latin America.
3. Canada could aid and assist economically and socially these smaller and weaker states.
4. Canada would benefit by the knowledge and contact with Latin America.

There are on the other hand strong arguments against joining. The major ones are:
1. Canada's membership in the Commonwealth might conflict with membership in O.A.S.
2. Canada might conceivably be in continual disagreement with the United States and its aggressive "non-aggression" policies.
3. Canada can play a more constructive role by remaining independent.
Membership in the O.A.S. would cost too much.
