Uxbridge Family in Two-Car Crash

A three year old Newmarket girl was killed and four members of an Uxbridge family were injured in a violent two-car accident north of Whitby on Wednesday afternoon of last week.

Arlene Feikenna died almost instantly in the crash. Eight others were admitted to hospital.

Members of the Uxbridge family included Mr. John Gregg, his wife Jean and their two children, Wesley 2 and Lynne 4. The collision occurred at the intersection of Thickson and Rosland Roads in Whitby w.p. Three ambulances were summoned to the scene.

Hooker Firm Has Low Truck Bids

The Kinsale firm of Alvin Hooker and sons has been awarded two out of three tenders by the Twp. of Pickering. Their bid on the 1 ton vehicle was \$2,738.43 and on the 1/2 ton it was \$2,064.33. Both are General Motors.

The purchase of a gravel truck went to Burrows of Brougham for a price of \$5,519.68. A total of six tenders were received.

Council noted that on the gravel truck bid the Burrows firm was \$1,000 less than another dealer on exactly the same make of vehicle.

Debate Support For All-Star Hockey Team

The Pickering Twp Recreation Committee is undecided on whether it should lend financial support to an all-star hockey entry in the O.M.H.A.

The request for \$500 was placed before a meeting at Brougham last week by Mr. Ron Stewart of Bay Ridges. He said that the money was required to purchase ice time in the Whitby and Brooklin arenas.

Mr. Stewart said that the club had been named Bay Ridges by the Ontario Minor Hockey Association but the players would come from other parts of the township as well as the Bay Ridges community. He estimated that 84 boys would be trying to catch positions on the team and felt that the project should not be dropped.

Not Enough Benefit

Donald Hopkins, a member of the committee objected strongly to the donation of funds to an all-star club. He noted that only a few boys would benefit while thousands of other young boys would be neglected. He recommended that the hockey program should be operated on a basis similar to the township minor softball league where more boys would participate.

Mr. John Campbell agreed that it would be better if more boys could join in the sport instead of a selected few.

Chairman, Donald Beer spoke in favour of an entry in the Ontario Rural Hockey Assoc.

Clifford Laycox outlined the value of an all-star entry and the expenses involved in such a program. Decision on the issue was reserved.

For the past fifty years, it has been the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gostick and on Wednesday, Aug. 19th, the well-known couple celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

Mr. Gostick was born at this residence, the son of the late Thomas Gostick and Elizabeth Scarr. He attended Mt. Pleasant Public School. Mrs. Gostick the former Hattie Whittleton was born at Goodwood, the daughter of the late Edmund Whittleton and Ada Storey. She was one of 10 children and attended public school at Goodwood.

Came To Stay

The two were brought together under unusual circumstances. Mr. Gostick's mother became ill and the then, Miss Whittleton agreed to help out around the home. She so impressed her future husband that they were later married at the parsonage in Stouffville in 1914. Although they embarked on no honeymoon trip at that time, they have since done some travelling and only recently returned from a long-distance train trip to the West Coast.

To the couple was born eight children. Seven are living, including six daughters, Muriel, Myrtle, Kathleen and Edith Gostick; Nellie (Mrs. Wm. Hopkins) of Ashburn, Ada, (Mrs. Fred Hodgson) of Brougham and one son Russel, at home. A second son, Maurice is deceased. They have two grandchildren, Maurice Hopkins and Gary Gostick.
