A demonstration of timber hewing will again be given by Mr. Milton Parkin of Kinsale while John DeWitt will be there splitting his giant stone in the old art of the stone mason. Howard Turner and Andy Ransay will be back cutting souvenir

slabs of wood with the popular drag saw demonstration. Tom Philip and Hugh Miller will thresh grain with the giant threshing machine. The primitive art of grain flailing will be revived by Mr. Alf Kayes and Charlie Fuller. A major new addition to this year's activities will be seen by visitors as Ken Hastings drives two teams of horses in the primitive horse power, the machine used to operate power implements before the days of steam engines.
