Mr. and Mrs. Grant Wells were entertained to dinner Saturday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. Baker Willowdale.

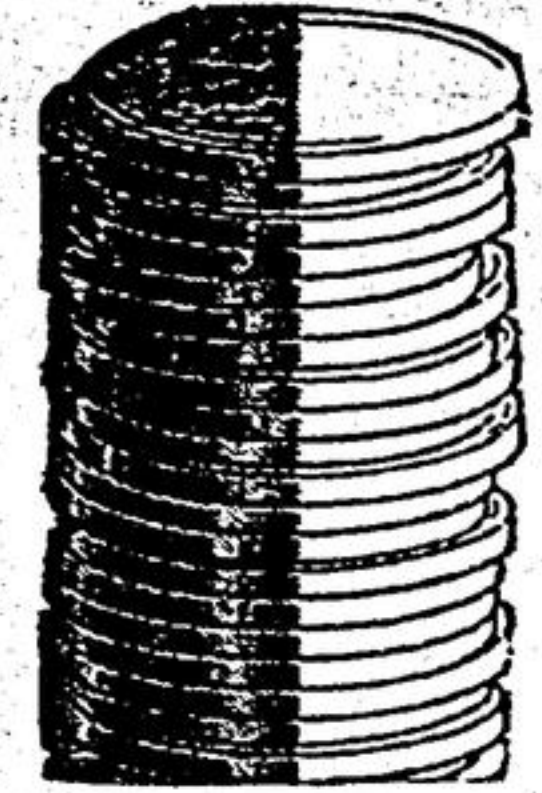
Mr. and Mrs. R. McKinney and family were Sunday dinner guests with Mr. and Mrs. J. Nauta.
