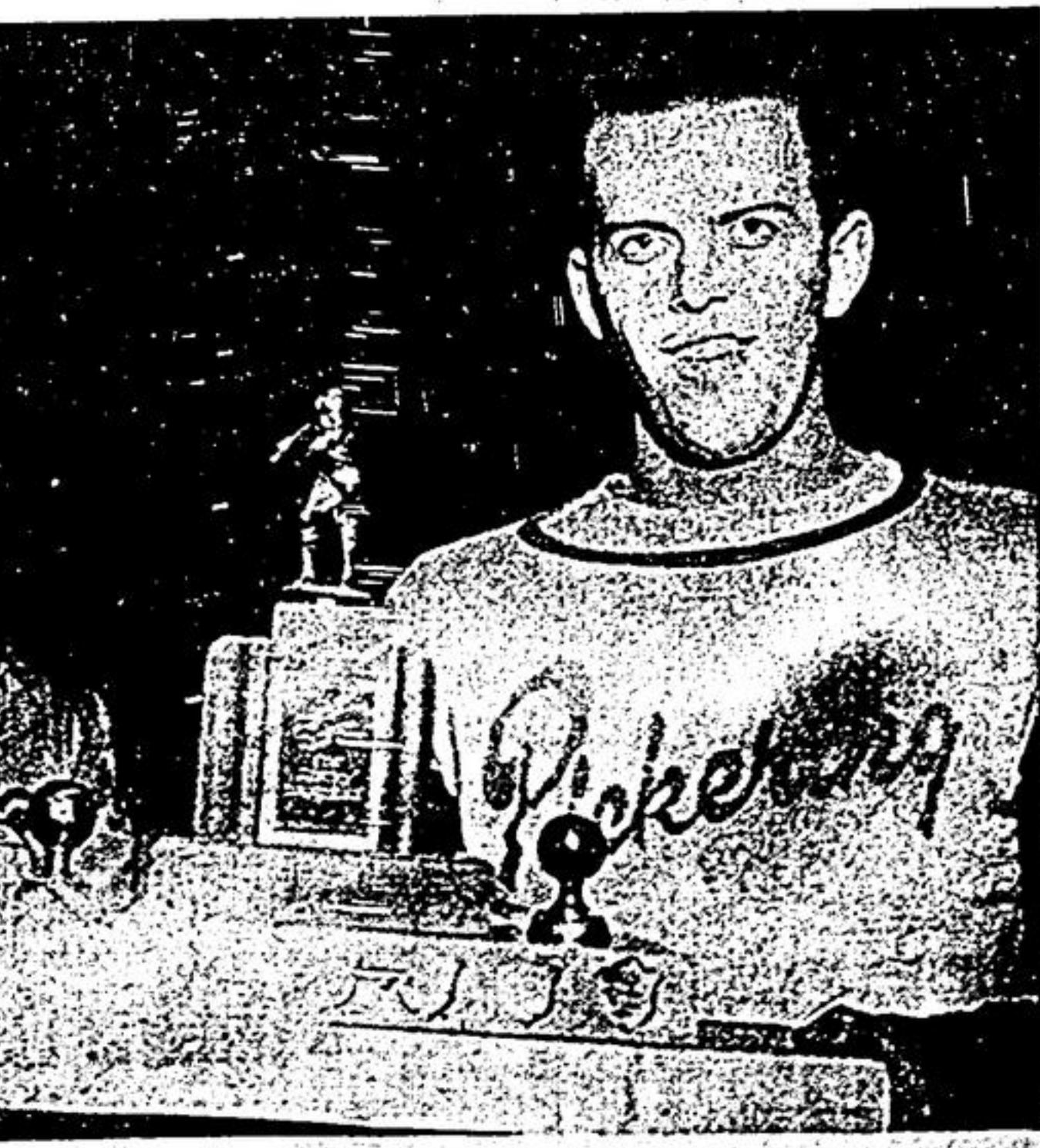

400 Vehicles Daily Use Pine Orchard Level Crossing

The Board of Transport has instructed the C.N.R. to obtain the total cost of installing automatic warning signals at the level crossing near Pine Orchard in Whitechurch Twp. This site was the scene of a double fatality in 1963 when a car was struck broadside by a north-bound freight train.

An Inspector with the Transport Board reported that more than 400 vehicles passed over the crossing daily. He said also that the view allowed a driver only 11 seconds from the time a train first appeared from the south to when it reached the road.

Whitechurch Twp. will cover 12 1/2% of the cost plus 50% of the maintenance. It is not expected that the work will be completed until next year.
