**Ringwood Pastor**  
  
 (Rev. Barry Jones, Pastor)  
 The Toronto Bible College Chorale will be leading two services at the Ringwood Christian Church this Sunday, giving a lively start to the congregation's 140th Anniversary Services.  
 The Church was first established in the year 1824 on Oct. 2nd, when a charter was drawn up and signed by twenty-eight members. The original charter, which was handwritten, is still in the possession of the congregation and will be displayed at the church during the week of Anniversary services. The congregation originally met in a school house at the corner of the 7th Conc. and the Whitchurch-Markham townline. Later the first church was erected on the west side of the 7th Conc. just south of the townline.  
 In 1863 a new and larger church was built on the townline. This 96 year old building is the church which the congregation still worship in today. The opening services took place on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day of 1863. At one o'clock on Christmas Day a great dinner was served in the driving shed at the rear of the church. Old documents outlining plans for this event tell us:  
 "We purpose by the assistance of our friends to furnish a regular old fashioned Christmas dinner (minus the English plum pudding perhaps) and as the little branch at Ringwood is weak and heavily pressed, we hereby invite our sister churches to take the matter in hand and prepare their roast beef, legs of mutton, geese, turkeys, chicken, boiled ham with all their accompaniments, etc., etc. All hands come with well filled sleighs, hearts full of love to God and good will to man, pockets laden with "the needful" and I am sure we shall have a good time. We purpose to have a dining room, 22 by 100 feet or upwards, comfortable and well replenished.  
 Beginning on Sunday, Nov. 22nd, the congregation of the Ringwood Christian Church will commence a week of special services on the occasion of their 140th anniversary. The original church was established in 1824. The present structure, located west of Ringwood, was erected in 1868. The Pastor, Rev.  I think we will have ample accommodation for all that may come."  
 It was a bitterly cold day but from the records we read, "It was the greatest feast of the kind we ever attended, several hundred must have partaken of the dinner. Speeches followed in the chapel."  
 In 1952 the church was moved back 30 feet from the road and a basement was built to enlarge the facilities. In the past two years the frame building has been covered with aluminum siding on the outside, and replastered on the inside. Further improvements are planned for the future.  
**Outstanding Choir**  
 An outstanding feature of these Anniversary Services will be the visit of the 40 voice Toronto Bible College Chorale. This group have sung on TV and radio, made two L.P. records and travelled widely in Canada and the States. The Chorale represent Canada's oldest Bible College, and one that has graduated thousands of students. Graduates are now serving Christ in 56 countries of the world.  
 Another feature will be a display of old photographs of members and friends, past and present, and of various special occasions which have taken place in the history of the church. This is expected to draw much attention.  
 On the final Sunday evening of the Anniversary Week, Dr. J. H. Hunter, the noted author, speaker and editor of "The Evangelical Christian" will make an unusual presentation. He will recite from memory, the story of John Bunyan's "The Pilgrim's Progress."  
 The congregation is eagerly anticipating these special services planned for the week of November 22nd to 29th and warmly invite all friends and interested neighbours to join with them on this joyful occasion.

**Report From Parliament**  
 by Michael Starr, M.P. ...  
 Parliament has been assured by the Prime Minister that the Canada Pension Plan Resolution will be placed on the Order Paper before the end of October. When it will be introduced for discussion is another matter. This present Session is the longest in history, and it is doubtful whether the Resolution will be passed before the end of the year, because of other matters to be considered.  
 By the end of October the Government will again be forced to ask Parliament for interim supply in order to pay its bills at the end of the month. The reason for this action is the fact that the estimates of all Departments of the Government have not yet been approved. The passing of interim supply will take a few days because there are a number of matters that have to be dealt with by Parliament.  
 Some 53 matters have been dealt with by Parliament since this session began in February of this year. This, of course, does not include the time spent on many other routine and special debates that were disposed of during this period. In addition approximately three quarters of an hour is spent each day on the oral question period. The written questions are dealt with twice a week but they only take a comparatively short period of time.  
 Time is also a factor when Ministers of the Crown make long drawn-out announcements on Motions. This announcement is usually followed by comments from the Leader of the Opposition and the three leaders of the other parties in the House of Commons. Depending on the importance of the announcement, the time consumed by the Minister and the comments can be of fairly long duration. When questioned in the House of Commons as to what the Government expects to pass in the form of legislation before the end of the session, the Prime Minister was unable to state exactly what his intentions are. This lack of a definite program leaves the House of Commons in a quandary as to what lies ahead of them and what their goal is for this session. Consequently, this session may end in a long time to come.  
 The report of the flag committee is due soon and evidently the Government wishes to have this matter resolved before Christmas. The Labour Code has to be completed, as well as
