Dep-Reeve Rumble Walks Out Of Markham Meeting

"Council in all fairness to the public, should stick to the rules of procedure. This is basic to good government," said Deputy-Reeve Stewart Rumble in a statement after he had walked out of a recent special Markham Township Council meeting. The special meeting had been called to appoint a representative to the court of revision. At the November 2 council meeting, two men had been nominated but as Councillor Robert Sloan was absent and neither Councillor Cleary Palmer nor Councillor Charles Hoover would withdraw their nomination, the four man council was stalled on the decision and a special meeting was called, at which it was hoped the missing member would be present.

When Reeve Hooper opened the November 4 meeting commenting that there were no deputations and otherwise conducting it as a regular council meeting, Mr. Rumble objected that it was a special meeting to consider only the one matter. The appointment to the court of revision was then discussed and in the interests of unity Councillor Palmer withdrew his nomination of Benjamin Lynd and Councillor Hoover's nominee, Howard Stiver was accordingly appointed.

This little bit of business, Mr. Rumble noted, cost the ratepayers of Markham Twp. over \$100 as councillors are paid \$18 for each meeting they attend, plus a mileage allowance. The reeve then went on to consider other business, at which point Mr. Rumble objected more strongly and had Clerk Harry Crisp read the rules governing special council meetings. They confirmed his contention, stating that 24 hours notice must be given of a special meeting and that matters to be considered are to be included in the notice.

While he was content to waive formal notice of the meeting, as he had been present when it was planned, Mr. Rumble felt it was entirely out of order to discuss anything but what had been originally intended. When Reeve Hooper insisted in proceeding in spite of the rules, Deputy-Reeve Rumble left the meeting. "It's no way to conduct a meeting," he stated, "with the reeve making up the rules as he goes along." After Mr. Rumble's angry exit, council went on to consider other matters, including expropriation proceedings against the Shouldice Surgery.

When Reeve Hooper insisted in proceeding in spite of the rules, Deputy-Reeve Rumble left the meeting. "It's no way to conduct a meeting," he stated, "with the reeve making up the rules as he goes along." Youth in Court Over Damage To Cemetery

Michael Campbell, 17 of R.R. 1, Milliken was convicted Tuesday in Richmond Hill for damage caused in the Hagerman Hill Cemetery on Kennedy Rd. He was remanded one week while Magistrate Russell Pearce checks further into the case. The cemetery was damaged to the extent of \$58.50 on Oct. 28th by three youths. Two of the boys were juveniles. P. C. John McCague of the Markham Twp. police, told the Court that 25 markers were toppled of which 10 were broken. Earlier that same evening, six boys, all under 16 except Campbell, tossed tomatoes at passing motorists from the cemetery property. Three boys left the scene while the remainder toppled the 25 stones. "This act shows utter disrespect," said Magistrate Pearce. Campbell, a high school student, was released in the custody of his father. The sentence will be handed down next week.

Fire Threatens Unionville Landmark

Unionville firemen were confronted with a real problem on Saturday morning when sparks from a fire in the veterans hall on Main Street ignited the wooden shingles on the roof. Their ladder equipment was not adequate to reach the source of the blaze, over fifty feet from the ground. Chief Meryl Smith called for assistance from Markham and the fire was then extinguished. Damage was not extensive.

The hall, a one-time Presbyterian Church, is a landmark structure in the village. It is used by several organizations in the community for public meetings and euechres.

Chooses Jail Rather Than \$100 Fine

A 22 year old Newmarket youth, charged by Whitchurch Twp. police with impaired driving, chose to spend seven days in jail on Monday rather than pay a \$100 fine.

Terrence M. Bell, unemployed but married with two children, was apprehended on Oct. 16th as he left a house on the Vivian Sideroad near the 7th of Whitchurch. One part bottle of beer and five full bottles were found in the cab of his truck.

Although the custody papers were filled out by the court clerk, officials at the magistrate's office at Newmarket were not sure if Bell had later altered his decision.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION to the Ontario Municipal Board by the Corporation of the Township of Markham for approval of a by-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 30 of The Planning Act. TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Markham intend to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 30 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 2113 passed on the 13th day of October 1964. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith. Any person interested may, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Township of Markham notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law together with a statement of the grounds of such objection. The Ontario Municipal Board may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection. The last date for filing objections will be December 3rd, 1964.

BY-LAW NUMBER 2113
A by-law to amend By-law Number 2005. BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM: 1. The By-law Number 2005 be and the same is hereby amended by deleting from paragraph 2 of the said by-law all that part of the said paragraph following the words "the whole of the Township of Markham" so that paragraph 2 as amended will read as follows: 2. The following area is hereby defined as an area of the Township of Markham to which this by-law shall apply: The whole of the Township of Markham. 2. This by-law shall come into effect on the day it is passed by the Council subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board. READ a first and second time this 13th day of October, 1964. EXPLANATORY NOTE
By-law Number 2005 prohibits the making or establishment of pits and quarries in the whole of the Township of Markham except certain defined lands. By-law Number 2113 amends By-law Number 2005 by removing the said excepted lands so that By-law Number 2005 as amended will prohibit the making and establishment of pits and quarries throughout the whole of the Township.
