Four Tenders for New Fire Truck

Markham Township Council has received four tenders for a new fire truck for the Unionville Brigade. The tenders were received at the regular meeting of council on Monday and referred to the Fire Chief and the township's fire committee for a recommendation. This Wednesday morning was set as the date for considering the committee's recommendation.

Council members have received a report from Wood, Gordon & Co. on the township offices with recommendations as to the use of the present space and additional requirements. The report will be reviewed at a later date.

Ratcliff Pine Tree May Be Record

A 350 year old tree, located in Ratcliff's bush on the 6th conc. of Whitchurch Twp. has suddenly become famous. This virgin white pine has attracted the interest of the Dept. of Lands and Forests and officials believe it to be the oldest and largest of its kind in South Central Ontario.

The tree measures 130 feet in height and would exceed that mark but a portion of the top has fallen off. It is about 350 years old. Officials believe it contains sufficient wood to build 2½ houses. It takes 2½ men to span the trunk.

The 100 acre hardwood bush has been in the Ratcliff family name for 100 years. The white pine, although stripped of many of its branches, is still quite sound. It will be retained by the owners as a district landmark.

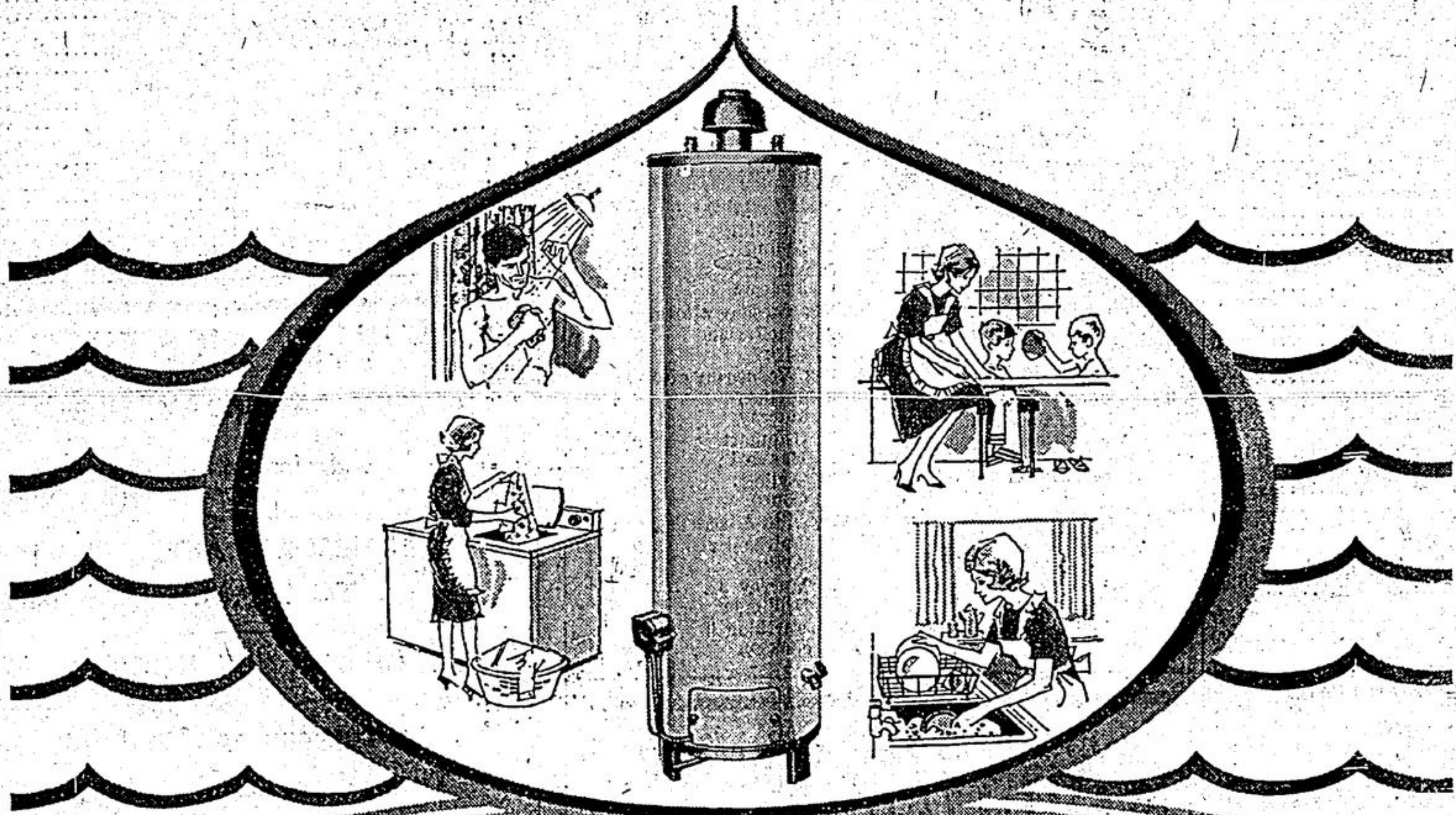
