Not A Single Complaint Against Pheasant Hunters

Thirteen regulated townships in the Lake Simcoe District issued 5,518 township hunting licenses during the pheasant season which ended November 7. Resident licenses totalled 2,047 and non-resident totalled 3,471. This represented a decrease of 10.6% in the total issued as compared to the previous year, reports the Department of Lands and Forests.

More than 9,000 pheasants, including 4,750 day-olds, 4,000 poults and 650 adults were distributed by the department to the regulated townships in 1964. These totals do not include Markham, East Whitby, Toronto and Albion Townships. In addition Whitechurch Township released 496 adult birds last spring, which they had carried over from the previous year.

A field check of 1,795 hunters carried out by conservation officers during the open season indicated a harvest of 967 birds or half a bird per hunter. This is an increase of 15% over 1963. The time required to kill a pheasant averaged 6.4 hours of hunting, a decrease of about one hour as compared to 1963.

Unusual weather conditions greeted hunters on opening day of the season, with a cold rain starting in the morning and turning to snow by afternoon. Hardy hunters were rewarded by good success in the Townships of Pickering, King and Chinguacousy, capturing an average of one bird per hunter.

While some hunters reported a bird scarcity in certain townships others obtained a complete bag in the very few hours of hunting. The overall picture presented a fair increase in the harvest over previous years.

One significant feature was that with hunters wearing the new numbered back patch for the first time not one complaint was received at the district office of any hunter-landowner problem.

Sandford Man Killed

Crown Attorney Bruce Affleck has announced that an inquest will be held into the death of Fernley Stead, of Sandford. Stead died Christmas Day in the Oshawa General Hospital 2 1/2 hours after he was hit by a car while crossing Gibb Street, Oshawa on Thursday night.

Stead was an inspector with General Motors.

The 38-year-old man suffered head injuries, a dislocated right shoulder, and a fractured right leg in the crash.

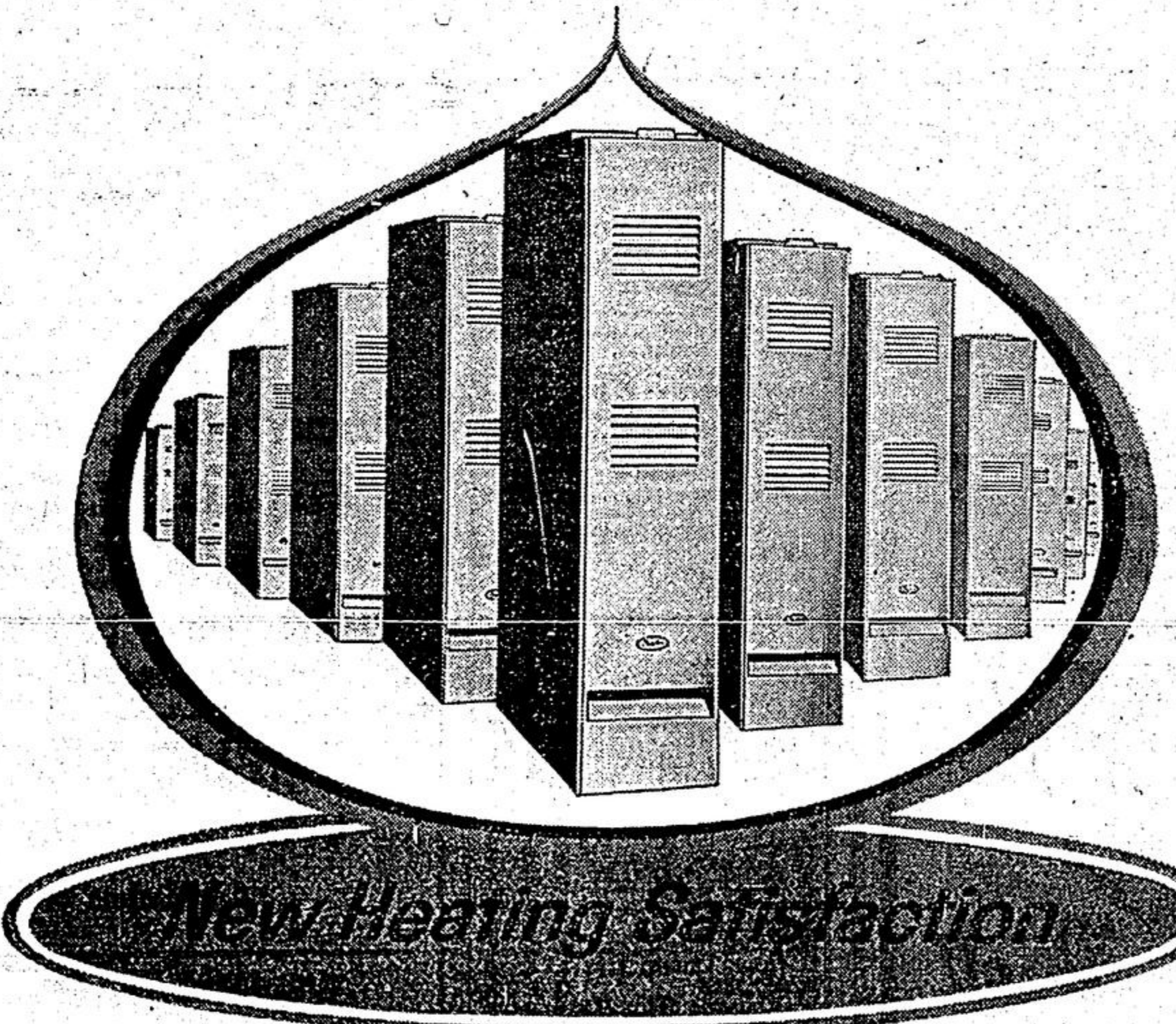
