A Whitchurch coroner's jury has found that a Lake Wilcox lad was killed partly because of poor driving conditions and partly because he was wearing dark clothing and walking with the traffic.
 Dr. G. W. Williams sat as coroner in the investigation into the accidental death of Brian Donald Melia, 13, fatally injured when he was struck on the North Road by a car driven by Gordon Keith Munro, 21, of Whitchurch.
 The boy was walking home with his brother, James Peter, 15, when both were hit by the car. The brother was able to be rescued from York County Hospital as an inquiry witness. Other witnesses were Willowdale pathologist Dr. N. Medline, Herbert Melise of Bayview Ave., Mr. Munro and Whitchurch Const. John Murray.
 The jury included George E. Richardson, Robert M. Kennedy Keith W. Horton, M. G. Slater and William T. Paine.

Local M-F Dealer Goes To Mexico
 Markham Township Deputy-reeve Stewart Rumble and Mrs. Rumble of Headford will leave in the middle of January for a four-day stay in Mexico.
 Mr. Rumble, as well as being deputy-reeve and operating a farm, is the proprietor of Rumble Equipment, the local Massey-Ferguson dealer and won the trip by sales performance during the past year.
 As part of a complicated industrial air charter, the Rumbles will fly to Mexico in company with 300 other dealers from more than 40 take-off points in Canada and the United States. The group will stay in Mexico four days, attend an M-F product demonstration and then return to their home-town in aircraft that a few hours before delivered another 300 to the demonstration. In all more than 5,000 leaders and sales personnel from all over North America will attend the show during January and February.
