Mr. and Mrs. Fred C Main Street East, cele ated their Golden Wedding Anniversary on Tuesday. December 29. The hospitable couple were united in marriage in 1914 by Rev. Edwards in his private home on Don Mills Road.

Mrs. Griffin, formerly Mary Andrews, was born in morden, better known today as East York in Metropolitan Toronto. Mr. Griffin was born on the corner of Coxwell and Danforth, the present site of the TTC streetcar barns. It was only a few minutes walk between the two homes, and the couple have known each other since childhood.

Mr. Griffin was a farmer, specializing in market gardening. Four years after their marriage, in 1918, the couple pur-chased a farm considered in those days "miles away from the city." Today, the farm is still standing, amidst a drive-in theatre, multi-storey apartments, 4lane highways, and thousands of people at the corner of Kennedy Rd. and Eglinton Avenue.

Taxes Were \$36 The couple grew fruit and vegetables on their 10 acre plot of land, had barns, greenhouses, sheds, and numerous other buildings, yet the farm was only taxed for \$36 a year.
