

CHIROPRACTIC VIEWPOINT:

Heart Disease and Spinal Nerve Pressure

A recent publication of the British Journal Of Physical Medicine stresses the importance of a basic teaching of Chiropractic, that pressure on spinal nerve roots causes disease symptoms. This article deals specifically with nerve pressure that causes symptoms of heart disease.

In reporting on a group of patients who were treated for coronary thrombosis, Dr. Weiser states, that over 50% of the patients did not actually have true cardiac disease, but that the symptoms, which were of the same intensity, quality and distribution of coronary pain, came from pressure on spinal nerve roots caused by mechanical disturbances of the spinal column. X-ray examination revealed either arthritic changes of the joints between the vertebrae, or indications of displacements of the intervertebral discs.

The treatment applied is essentially the removal of pressure on nerves by correction of posture and manipulation of the spine. Dr. Weiser reports excellent results with patients whose complaints had previously been attributed to a coronary condition.
