Brown Is "Clipper" Hero; Fires Winner Against Bobcaygeon

Edge League Leaders 4-3

Minus their captain, Barry McLean and rugged defenseman, Wayne Keeler, Stouffville "Clippers" defeated the Bobcaygeon "Ti-Cats" at the arena Tuesday night.

The homesters spotted Bobcaygeon two goals before roaring back to win 4-3, in a real thriller.

Ross Brown was the hero of the game when he fired the winning goal at the 13:42 mark of the final period. Only moments prior to that, Pete Reesor tied the game at 3-3, when, on a breakaway, he drifted a shot into the top right corner.

The Stouffville Club started out flying in the first few minutes of the game, but were scored on twice. Dale Junkin hit the target at 1:48 and less than a minute later, John Nicholls put the visitors two up.

A scramble in front of Joe Junkin, Bobcaygeon goalie, resulted in the first Stouffville goal. Pete Reesor hit the post, with a mile of shooting space, and Tom Benson roared in to bat the loose puck home. Halfway through the first period, Stouffville came so close to scoring, it fooled the goal judge. The light went on but no goal was scored.

The "Clippers" swarmed like bees around the visitors for the remainder of the period, then poured it on again in the middle frame. At the 52 second mark, Robin Hood found his brother, Jim Hood in the clear, fed him a pass and Jim in turned tied the game at 2-2.

Ron Oliver broke through a tight Stouffville defense and raced in alone on "Chuck" Doyle firing a wicked shot that was blocked. However, the puck got away from the goalie, and still with no protection, he had no chance when Cary Martin, smartly slipped in the rebound.

On a power-play, Bobcaygeon broke loose to tie the score. Stouffville fans nearly brought the roof down, when Brown broke the tie, giving the "Clippers" the lead for the first

time in the contest. The homesters cooled down their red-hot offensive power and switched to defensive hockey. They checked the "Ti-Cats" before a rush could get going and iced the puck several times.

Spectators were awaiting the removal of Junkin from the "Ti-Cat" net, but only after the 18:45 mark did he take a position on the bench. Six attackers were inside the Stouffville blue line for the crucial play. Seconds seemed like minutes to players and fans alike, but at the sound of the final whistle, the arena shook with thundering applause for the victors.

Doyle was mobbed by his mates for his efforts in the cage and upon leaving the ice, was congratulated by members of the Bobcaygeon cheering section.

Saunders the Captain
As a result of a heavy check Friday night in Bobcaygeon, Barry McLean was sidelined for Tuesday's contest. Coach Harold Hodgson labeled Saunders with the Captain's letters, and he proved that the coach had made the right decision. When Saunders moved, the team moved, and he was in high-flight all night.

It was the first game of the season that McLean had missed. In every game he played, the high flying marksman managed at least one point. McLean himself felt he could play, but the coach said no. Hodgson said that McLean was needed for the playoffs, and there was no point in risking a more serious injury by letting him play on Tuesday.

Also on the injury list is Wayne Keeler. The defenseman was involved in a car accident last Saturday, resulting in shoulder and arm injuries that could sideline him for the remainder of the season. Further X-rays will be taken to determine whether he will be able to see playoff action or not.

Tuesday's win was the first Stouffville has enjoyed over the league-leading Bobcaygeon club. In three other meetings, the "Clippers" went down in defeat. It was the last regular game scheduled against the rugged "Ti-Cat" team this season.

Only three games remain in the "Clippers" itinerary. They meet Sutton-Cannington Sunday, at Sutton, return home to host Woodville on Tuesday and wrap the season up in Little Britain on January 28th.

Clippers Bow To Bobcaygeon

Barry McLean, captain of the Stouffville Clippers suffered a badly bruised left arm from a solid check handed out Friday night in Bobcaygeon. McLean had to leave the game in the last period as his team went down to a 10 to 5 defeat at the hands of Bobcaygeon. Clippers highest point-getter was belted by John Nicholls who received a five-min. penalty for charging.

Bobcaygeon took command from the opening faceoff and poured a stream of pucks at Chuck Doyle. They led 4-1 at the end of the first period. Every Stouffville drive to get back in the game was stopped.

Paul Grills opened the scoring at 9:14 and Joe Handley put the Ti-Cats two up just four minutes later. Ron Ingram made it 3-0 before Tom Benson got Stouffville's first goal. Shortly after Chuck Doyle had stopped Ross Wray on a breakaway, Barry McLean got his 20th goal of the season. But the Ti-Cats came right back with two more. Junkin came in with such speed, he couldn't stop and went into the boards with his head. He had to be helped off the ice but returned later.

Bill Corner scored for the Clippers with the opposition a man short. With a two-man advantage Stouffville got back in the game as Pete Reesor scored. In the dying seconds of the second period the Clippers scrambled around the opposition net claiming a goal but the ref said "no."

Pete Reesor got his 20th goal just after McLean had been hoisted into the boards. Dale Junkin showed the fans his bump on the head hadn't bothered him as he let a slapshot go that zipped through Doyle's hand. With Bobcaygeon two men short for the third time, Stouffville was unable to score.

Ross Wray let go with a vicious swing in the last period just missing Bill Corner's head by inches.

Stouffville played well despite the score and stayed out of the penalty box. Clippers have lost a number of games by penalties but are playing a cleaner brand of hockey much to the liking of the fans.
