### Tips on Soil Mixtures For House Plants

Many people use garden soil for their indoor plants. The plants often thrive in such a soil for a while, later, however, there may appear certain adverse conditions that can be traced to the soil. Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture suggest that a well-prepared mixture will give better results.

A good general mixture may consist of 7 parts of loam or good garden soil, 2 parts organic matter such as peat moss, 1 part well-rotted manure and 2 parts building sand. To each bushel of soil mixture add about half a four inch pot of super-phosphate and mix thoroughly before use. If the garden soil is low in fertility add a complete fertilizer such as 5-10-15 at the rate of half a four inch pot of fertilizer, plus the same amount of superphosphate per bushel.

For best results, the soil mixture should be sterilized before the fertilizer is added. Sterilized soil gives plants maximum protection against insects, diseases and weeds. Small amounts may be sterilized in the oven. Place a pan of moist soil in the oven and heat it to 160 degrees F. for at least 20 minutes. Another method is to pour enough boiling water through the soil to heat it to 170 to 200 degrees F. Allow the soil to drain and dry to the right moisture content before use. All soils when ready for potting should be just moist enough to hold together when squeezed tightly.

Larger quantities of soil may be treated with chemicals. Use 37% commercial formalin. For each bushel of soil sprinkle on a solution of formalin 2½ table-spoonsful in water to make 1 cup-full (8 fluid ounces). Thoroughly mix the chemical with the soil and place in a clean metal container; cover with a layer of wet newspapers, to seal in fumes; then put the cover on.
