Plan Five-room Addition To Orchard Park School, Stouffville

A five-room addition is proposed for the Orchard Park Public School in Stouffville at a cost estimated at \$120,000. Representatives of the school board outlined their plans before a meeting of town council on Thursday night. Trustee Ian Chapman was the spokesman for the delegation that included Mrs. Barbara Hambly, Mrs. Elsie Sanders (secretary) and the two principals, Lorne Boadway and Keith Sutherland. Tentative approval on the project has been received from the Dept. of Education. A portion of this additional accommodation will include a multipurpose room that can be used as an auditorium or converted into two classrooms if increased attendance warrants such a move. It was revealed that a minimum of two extra rooms would be required by September and two additional teachers would be added to the staff. 
During the past three weeks, hundreds of lucky draw admission tickets have been sold in connection with the Minor Hockey League program at the arena.
