"Mommy, he's brown!" Yet the fringe of yellow white hair rooted in the clean brown of his flesh, curled in innocence and helplessness. He had lived a life as deeply scarred as the furrows plowed in his face. Because of the color of that face, the seeds of his lost youth had gone unplanted. The future he might have harvested never came, because the soil that was forced, by nature, to support it, was condemned.




