

St. Andrews, Markham Over 800 Members

Continued growth of St. Andrews United Church, Markham was evident from all departments, when the annual congregational meeting was held last week. Membership has reached an all-time high of 821 members, an increase of 82 over 1963. During the year 48 infants were baptized; 16 weddings were solemnized and 21 burials conducted.

In the financial department, contributions from all sources averaged \$933 a week for a total

of \$48,500. The 1965 budget presented for approval calls for contributions averaging \$986 a week for a new total of \$51,300. General collections amounted to \$27,500. In addition over \$9,000 was donated for the missionary and maintenance fund, and over \$2100 given to support nine other countries. A considerable increase was reported in the special projects in Canada and use of weekly envelope-giving. This has risen 35% between 1962 and 1964.

New Residents
Rev. A. R. Wright, minister, pointed out that the great influx of new residents to Markham had caused a drastic change in the life of the church. The membership was no longer made up of old residents of the town.

Two important staff changes have been the engaging of a Christian Education Director, Miss Margaret Smith and the hiring of a full-time caretaker rather than part-time help.
