## Skating Pro Returns To Teach at Local Club Once Beginner, Now Instructress Here

About 12 years ago, a youthful blonde girl probably wobbled through her first figure-eight, glancing hopefully at her figure skating teacher, Christine Kennedy. The pretty, young girl, about eight years old, probably did quite a bit of day-dreaming, too. She likely saw herself gracefully skimming across the ice surface in full flight, executing double flips, front and back spirals, axels, and other complicated tricks that are involved in being a professional. That girl, who took her first skating lesson at the Stouffville arena was Miss Jean Winterstein.

She wanted to be good.

Today, Jean has grown up, is still pretty and blonde, is married, and is good. She is a pro.

Mrs. Jean Barclay has, through years of perseverance, placed herself in Christine Kennedy's position. She has become a figure skating teacher.

Membership of 111. Every Monday, Thursday and Friday, residents of the area can see what Jean has accomplished for herself, and what she is doing to help others make the grade, as she did. She teaches 111 children ranging in age from 2 to 15. Included among her students are 22 boys. Jean has lived in Stouffville all her life and was only married last September. She and her husband Larry live in an apartment over the IGA store on Main St. Larry is a cameraman for CFTO-TV in Toronto.

Jean's climb up the figure skater's ladder has been anything but easy.

"There are eight exams in figure skating," she explained. "I have passed six of them. Jean took her tests at Niagara Falls where she practised in the summers. She skated eight hours a day to attain her passing grades.

Asked if she ever felt discouraged, Jean answered, "The 4th test was about the hardest I ever tried, but, because I love skating so much, I kept right at it. It took time, but I made it. This is Jean's first year of teaching figure skating. She graduated from grade 12 and went to work for the Bell Telephone Company in Toronto. When she heard that the figure skating executive was looking for a teacher, she immediately applied and won the position.

She explained that figure skating requires more skill and concentration than the game of hockey.

"The boys usually drop out as they grow older and become interested in other sports," she said. "There are very few professional boy skaters."

Loved Sports  
 Jean offered her secrets for becoming a professional.

"You have to be a good sport," she stated. "A skater must learn to accept failures. Concentration is compulsory."

She has always loved sports. Figure skating is, of course, her favorite, but she participates in water-skiing, golf, curling and has her bronze medal in swimming.

She is a member of the United Church choir.

Jean speaks highly of Canada's top figure skaters. She says that Petra Burka is quite capable of capturing a gold medal for Canada.

"Canada's professionals are outstanding," she claimed.

Jean remembers the time Don Jackson skated at Stouffville.

"I admired him, and wanted to be as smooth a skater as he was. Maybe, he had something to do with my passing the exams."

Jean's big moment will come on April 10th when she will lead her 111 youngsters onto the ice for a huge "Ice Carnival." The theme for the show is "Robin Hood" and every one of her students will participate.

The show, climax to a season of hard work and cold feet, will bring to a close, Jean Barclay's first year as a figure skating instructress.

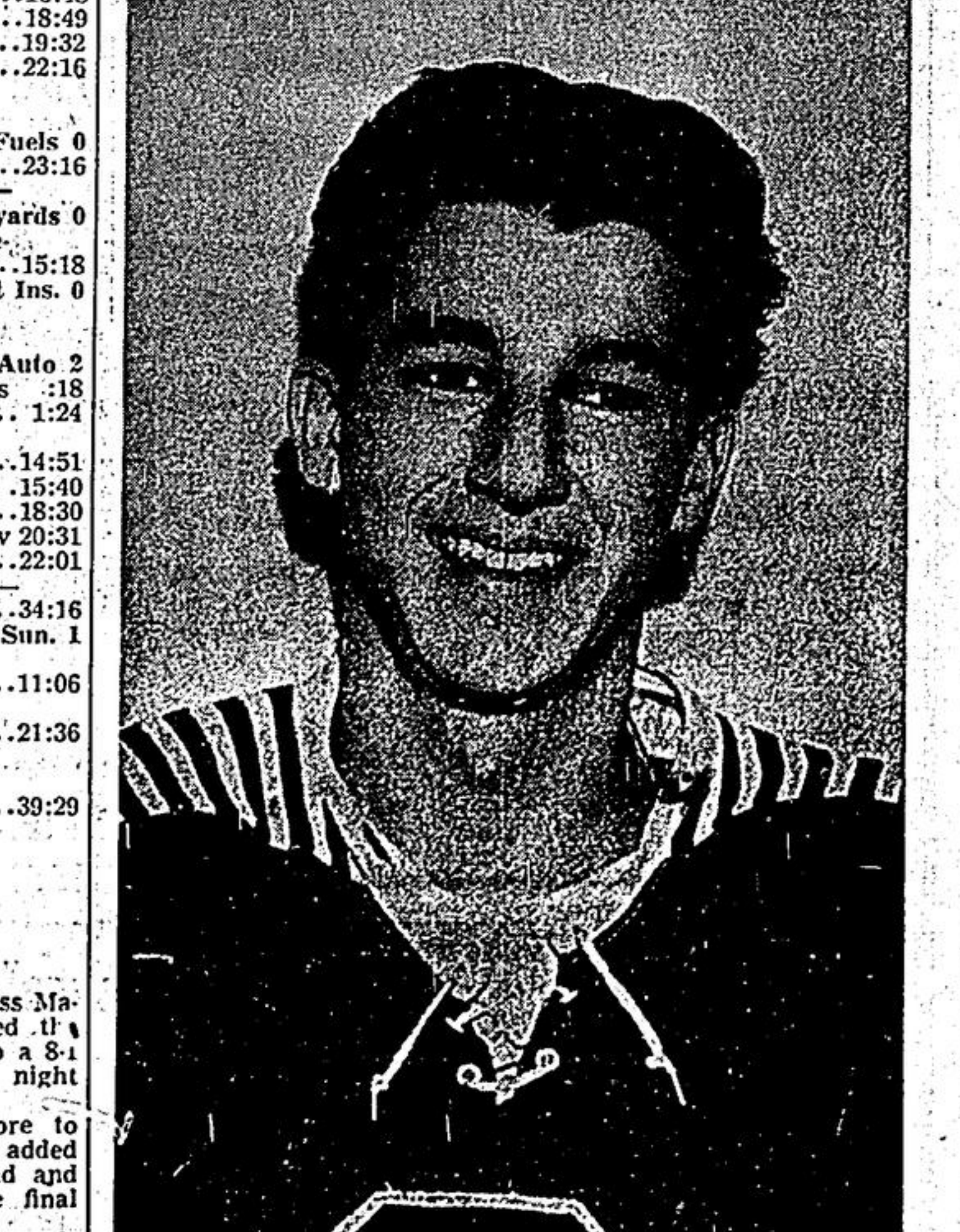
