Sir Winston Churchill Commemorative Stamp

Sir Winston Churchill will be honored on a special Canadian postage stamp to be issued late this summer. The announcement was made by the Honourable John R. Nicholson, Postmaster General.

This will be the first time in the history of the Canada Post Office that a stamp has been produced to honour a person who was neither a member of the Royal Family nor a Canadian. Mr. Nicholson explained that Sir Winston's tremendous contributions to the Commonwealth and his many associations with this country were adequate reasons for a departure from normal policy.

August 12th has been chosen as the date of issue. It was on this day in 1941 that Sir Winston and President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Atlantic Charter. The signing took place aboard a warship in Placentia Bay, on the south-east coast of Newfoundland. The August date also coincides with the first Quebec Conference, where in 1943 Sir Winston met with President Roosevelt and Canadian leaders to plan the prosecution of the war.
