Sir Winston Churchill Commemorative Stamp

Sir Winston Churchill will be honoured on a special Canadian postage stamp to be issued late this summer. The announcement was made by the Honourable John R. Nicholson, Postmaster General.

This will be the first time in the history of the Canada Post Office that a stamp has been produced to honour a person who was neither a member of the Royal Family nor a Canadian. Mr. Nicholson explained that Sir Winston's tremendous contributions to the Commonwealth and his many associations with this country were adequate reasons for a departure from normal policy.
