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Officers, Members Of M.T.R.C.A. Hold First Meeting For 1965

The 1965 annual meeting of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority held at the East York Township municipal offices last week saw the election of officers to the nine advisory boards and appointment of members.

The MTRCA administers the watersheds of the Etobicoke, Humber, Don, Rouge, Duffin Creek, Highland Creek and Pelee Island Creek lying within a 1,000-square-mile area. The Authority is principally concerned with flood control, establishment of conservation areas, land use, historical sites and reforestation throughout the area.

Chairman of the Authority is Dr. G. Ross Lord, P.Eng., one of Canada's foremost flood control engineers and head of the University of Toronto's mechanical engineering department, who is appointed by Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. At the meeting, former Alderman W. C. Davidson, of Toronto, was re-appointed Authority vice-chairman.

FARM REPORT

Heavy Farm Meeting Agenda For February

Farm meetings are coming thick and fast for the rest of February. Starting this week, the breed meetings are on in Toronto. The Holstein and Guernsey meetings are on Wednesday, at the Royal York Hotel. The annual meeting of the Beef Improvement Association starts on Thursday, and it combines with the breeders' Association on Friday, again at the Royal York Hotel.

The beef meeting and the cattle breeders' meetings, I think have a great deal to offer to commercial livestock men. The beef meeting features top speakers on beef production, and the meeting on Friday has livestock health as its main theme. We are fortunate in York County that these meetings are convenient to us, and I recommend them. They are open meetings and all farmers are welcome.

Next week is filled right up too. Monday and Tuesday are the days of the annual meeting of the Ontario Farming Association. With this being Flowing Match year in York County, we will have strong representation at this meeting. The Agricultural Societies meet on Wednesday and Thursday at the King Edward Hotel.

Next week is also Farmers' Week at O.A.C., Guelph. This is where the staff from the various departments at the college get together and discuss for farmers, the most recent changes in farm practices. The week is divided into special days for each subject.

Monday, Feb. 22nd, is Crops Day; Tuesday is devoted to Soils; and Dairy Cattle is the topic for Wednesday; Thursday is the day for Swine and on Friday, it's Beef Cattle Day.

Again, I think these will all be good sessions and useful for anyone making a living out of farming.

I know it is early, but the warm weather and rain last week makes one think of spring. It won't be long until seed starts to move. One kind of seed that warrants some attention now is corn. Early maturing varieties are tremendously important and they are the first to run short in dealers' stocks. It's a good

Gideons Report To Their Churches

Last Sunday, February 14 a total of 48 church services were conducted by the Gideons of the Toronto area as they told of what God is doing through the distribution of His word in 76 countries of the world. This special Sunday was designated by the Gideons of the local York County camp as Gideon Sunday in the town churches of York County. Another special church service Sunday will be held in the country churches on the 16th day of May. Some changes in this schedule have been made to accommodate all the churches.

The York County Gideon camp is one of the 165 camps in Canada distributing free copies of the Bible. Last fall some 2,600 Bibles and Testaments were placed in the York County schools, corrective institutions, hospitals, hotels, motels, etc.

The first Bibles were placed by the Canadian Gideons in a Toronto hotel, in 1911. Since that time nearly 5 million copies of the scriptures have been placed. The world total is well over 57 million.

The Gideons, a Christian layman's organization, work in close association with the churches of nearly every denomination. They are required to be members of adherents of some recognized branch of the Christian Church and look upon themselves as an arm of the church helping to carry out Christ's high commission according to 11 Corinthians chapter 5 and verse 20.

The budget of the Canadian Gideons this year is \$340,000. Of this amount \$60,000 is designated for the camps in India.

The support given to the memorial Bible plan by the Christian public has made a significant contribution toward reaching the financial objectives.

As a consequence of this scriptural activity, the Gideons annually receive thousands of letters. The writers are people with the same basic message from all walks of life and all say "Thank You."

Humility, faith and obedience were the elements of the Biblical Gideon's character, and this is the standard the Gideon association has always sought in its members. These members are businessmen in position of responsibility who possess singular characteristics and abilities. Men of vision and action are sought and in Canada today there are 2084 of these men. They are members of an international band of some 23,000 in 65 countries. Assisting them in Canada are 1,098 members of the Ladies' Auxiliary organized into 108 groups.

The head office is located at 90 Thorncliffe Park Drive, Toronto 17 and the only full-time paid employees of the association are an Executive Director, Executive Secretary, office and shipping staff of seven and three field secretaries, covering the Dominion.

The president of the York County Camp is Mr. Winston McFadden of Richmond Hill and the treasurer is Mr. Murray Bennett of R. R. 2, Gormley.

The continuing work of this organization is best summed up in the words of the Executive Director Mr. Arthur Burnham, "Wherever there are people, we are seeking to make the scriptures available."
