Silage for Sows

"Excessive weight gains in sows is expensive and inefficient," advises J. G. Norrish, Department of Animal Husbandry, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

Gilts should be permitted to gain 100 pounds during the first breeding season. In subsequent reproduction periods, a 75-lbs.

gain is adequate. The phase just before breeding until farrowing is referred to as the sow's dry period. Weight control during this time is important if a sow herd is to remain efficient and productive, since over-fat swine will farrow smaller litters. Since weight gained during the dry period is generally lost when farrowing and nursing, sows should weigh the same after each litter is weaned. Weights can be fairly well regulated if the sows are reared on pasture in summer and hay or silage in winter. Succulence and ease in handling make silage preferred to hay

during winter, however. "Trials at the Ontario Agricultural College indicate that each sow will eat up to ten lbs. of corn silage daily." says Mr. Norrish. "Yet slightly better sow and subsequent litter performances are obtained with 4 pounds of regularly balanced sow ration and six pounds of silage. This amount of silage results in a daily saving of two pounds of ration. If the diet consists mostly of nine to ten pounds of corn silage, then a special concentrate mixture of protein, vitamins, and minerals
