

Death Hits and Misses At Ringwood Intersection



Within a period of less than 24 hours this week, two separate accidents at the Ringwood intersection of No. 47 and 48 Hwys. took one life and caused an estimated \$13,000 in property damage. The driver of this car, Miss Jeanette Karantjas, Principal of Glasgow Public School in Uxbridge Twp., was killed on Monday afternoon.



The driver of this car, Robt. Roy Troughton of Scarboro missed death by only inches but suffered only minor injuries when his auto was crushed by a transport truck loaded with ten tons of potatoes. This accident also occurred at the Ringwood corner on Tuesday afternoon. O.P.P. from Bond Lake investigated both collisions.
