## EDITOR'S MAIL

Dear Mr. Editor:  
Thank you for encouraging the Markham Township Citizens' Committee by your editorial "Could Prove Beneficial." I am glad to provide some of the background information you invite.

As in other communities, many citizens of Markham care enough about their home environment to do something helpful and have been doing what they could individually and in local groups. But there has been increasing awareness of the need for Township-wide communication, understanding and co-operation. This awareness led different people to consider what form of organization would be most suitable, but there was some hesitation as to who should take the initiative.

The planning group whose recommendations finally produced our organization had three clearly stated objectives: (1) To establish contact between as many different interest groups (official and voluntary) as possible, so that each may appreciate the objectives of the other; (2) To enroll, as members, experienced persons who "prefer to act on facts rather than impulse"; (3) To facilitate community improvements in ways acceptable to present citizens and at a mini-

mum tax cost. As stated in your editorial, we do represent a good cross-section of community interests but we are not a closed corporation and would welcome a representative from any organization interested in Markham Township.

We have been quite surprised at the alarm raised in certain quarters at our requests for additional facts. As you stated, the press can only report what it hears and, too often, this has not been enough for mature decision making by all the parties affected.

Facts are like the pieces of a jig-saw puzzle, if we have enough of them put together, we no longer have to guess what is the real picture. For that reason we are developing facilities for getting background information and communicating it to our members in our bulletin; and we welcome the co-operation of the press and the citizens in this community service.
