Survey Needs Y. Presbytery

The effects of urbanization in York Presbytery of the United Church of Canada will be analysed and studied by the Presbytery. The Presbytery is aware of the extensive changes taking place within the area of its responsibility. Requirements and recommendations for Church extension during the next 10 years will be a major emphasis of concern in a survey of the Presbytery to be conducted during the next 6 months.

The Presbytery at its meeting held in Keswick on Tuesday, March 16th, authorized its Executive to engage the services of a professional survey firm, Project Planning Associates Limited, to carry out an objective survey and study, which will encompass the entire area of the Presbytery. Included in the project will be a survey of existing conditions, involving an examination of the present Congregational constituency and an examination of present facilities.

The survey will also provide a determination of anticipated development, including esti-

mates of future population, projection of future land use, and analysis of future United Church membership and likely residence of membership.

The Chairman of Presbytery, Dr. A. F. Binnington, reported that it is the aim of Presbytery to utilize the information gained through the survey to lay plans that will enable the Church to more effectively carry out its work, and provide for growth in the future.
